

## Proceedings of the Synod

June 29, 1922.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**  
The Synod met at 3.30, the Lord Bishop presiding. Prayers were read, then the House proceeded to business. The Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Rev. Canon Bolt gave notice that he would move for the Suspension of the Rules of Order for the remainder of the Synod. Rev. H. W. Facey gave notice that he would on to-morrow move certain Resolutions in relation to Finance. Dr. Blackall gave notice of a resolution relating to the valuable services rendered to the Church by the Lay Readers.

Rev. J. T. Richards moved his resolution which was duly seconded relating to the work of Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, in Northern Newfoundland and Labrador as follows, viz:—

**RESOLVED**—that the Synod having heard what remarkable aid has been afforded in the Deanery of the Straits of Belle Isle to the cause of humanity by the work of the Medical Mission under the charge of Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, C.M.G., desires to place on records their high appreciation of the work of Dr. Grenfell and of his brave and unselfish efforts in Northern Newfoundland and Labrador.

That a copy of the foregoing resolution be forwarded to Dr. Grenfell by the Secretary Treasurer.  
Rev. J. Richards said that for 25 years and more Dr. Grenfell had labored, not only in our Mission in the Straits of Belle Isle, but also in Northern Newfoundland and Labrador, and had supplied the northern portions of our Island and the Labrador coast with Doctors and Nurses and teachers, and during all that time the Church has never officially, in any way, placed on record an expression of appreciation for the great service he has rendered in the cause of humanity.

Rev. E. C. Earp, heartily supported the resolution, and praised the work.  
Rev. E. C. Earp said that he had known Dr. Grenfell for many years, and could bear testimony to Dr. Grenfell's praise of the fine and splendid work of Mr. Richards, the Missionary in the Straits of Belle Isle, the introducer of this resolution. Dr. Grenfell personally inspired people for service, and it was that inspiration which brought to him his co-workers. Dr. Blackall praised Dr. Grenfell's work and especially in connection with teaching, for during this summer there will be five of Dr. Grenfell's teachers devoted to the work of Education in White Bay.

Mr. N. Simms had a high regard for the work of Dr. Grenfell in the cause of suffering humanity. Perhaps it may be said that it is thought the agency of Dr. Grenfell that we have a Priest in Mission of St. Anthony, and the speaker regretted very much the fact

that such few young Newfoundlanders have been found even for the priesthood in Northern Newfoundland and Labrador. At present, with the exception of Flower's Cove all our Outposts, Ungava, Sandwich Bay, and St. Anthony, are filled by others than Newfoundlanders.

Canon Bayly, Hon. Eli Dawe, and Canon Smart, also heartily supported the resolutions and the work of Dr. Grenfell.

The motion received the unanimous vote of the House.  
Mr. Brian Dunfield moved the second reading of the Bill to Amend Chapter 1 and VII, of the Constitution and Rules of the Synod relating to the raising of the minimum qualification of Church members to speak at Parish meetings.

The motion was duly seconded and a very interesting debate took place, but it was felt that the time was not opportune for the change, and the introducer, with the consent of his second, move that leave be given to withdraw the Bill. The House agreed. On motion, the House adjourned at 5.30.

### EVENING SESSION.

The House resumed at 8 o'clock, the Lord Bishop presiding, who read their opening prayers.

Mr. G. J. Adams presented the report of the Select Committee of the Synod to consider a policy for more successfully conducting the Diocesan Magazine, by the appointment of a Joint Stock Company, with a nominal capital of \$5,000.00, divided into five thousand shares of one dollar each, and that the Literature Committee elected at each Biennial Session of the Synod be the directors of the said company, and moved its adoption, which was agreed.

Mr. I. J. Samson gave notice that he would on tomorrow move the appointment of a Committee in reference to the staff of Bishop Spencer, College.

Rev. Dr. Facey gave notice that he would on tomorrow move for the appointment of a Standing Committee to consider the recommendations appointed by the last Synod to deal with Finance.

The debate on the report of the Church of England Colleges was resumed and disposed of by the Report being adopted by the Synod. Mr. Dunfield moved the adoption of a Supplementary Report of the Church of England Colleges in regard to the Trust Fund entrusted to them by the Campaign Committee. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Morine moved, and it was duly seconded, that this motion be read six months hence. A very animated discussion took on the legal points involved and on division the motion was agreed to.

Re Mr. Long's notice of Question. His Lordship the Bishop ruled that the information asked for could not be tabled.

On motion duly seconded, Rev. E. A. Butler asked permission to withdraw his resolution concerning the holding the next session of the Synod at Grand Falls. Agreed.

In the absence of Lt.-Col. Goodridge of the C.L.E., Major G. R. Williams addressed the Synod on aims and objects of the Brigade, and appealed to the Clergy of the Synod who have not already companies operating in their Parishes to try and arrange to organize companies in the interest of the boyhood in Newfoundland.

On motion the Synod adjourned at 10.25, when the Bishop pronounced the Benediction.

## OBITUARY

Lawrence Parker.

Another venerable citizen in the person of Mr. Lawrence Parker, passed out of life last evening, at his home, Garrison Hill, at the age of 77 years and 4 months, having been born in St. John's in February 1845.

Deceased was the second son of the late William Parker, who conducted a mercantile business on Water St. East, on the site of the present premises of Colin Campbell, Ltd. On leaving school deceased entered the employ of the late John Hoggett, who conducted a flourishing establishment on Water Street, West. A few years later he joined his eldest brother, the late William Parker, who died in 1882, in the well remembered hardware business in which he figured prominently until the eventual bank crash of 1894, when like many others who suffered from this disaster, he was forced to close his business.

Undaunted, however, "Young Parker," as he was wont to call himself, started anew as a broker, and from then until a few days of his death he was a familiar figure along the street energetically pushing business. His cheerful, genial manner coupled with his persuasive powers, contributed greatly to his success in his line, and through the years there was probably no man in the business community better known or more highly esteemed. There survive him, his wife, formerly Miss Furlong, a member of a family also at one time prominent along Water Street, one daughter, and his younger brother, Mr. J. Parker, senior partner of Parker & Monro Ltd. He will be buried at Belvedere on to-morrow, Saturday, afternoon, and many will be the regrets that his familiar figure will henceforth be missed, not alone in the community generally, but amongst Board of Trade circles particularly where daily he was seen earnestly discussing all matters pertaining to the business life of our community.

## Fire at Curling

Word was received yesterday p.m. by Mr. A. L. Barrett that on Tuesday night the dwelling house owned by W. H. Parsons, Station agent, and occupied by B. D. Lilly at Curling, Bay of Islands, was totally destroyed by fire with all its contents. Both house and furniture were insured. The origin of the fire so far has not been discovered. Insurance carried was with the Phoenix of London, there being \$3,000 on the house and \$2,500 on its contents.



## ST. JOHN'S Municipal Council PUBLIC NOTICE

The attention of the Public is called to the Sections of the St. John's Municipal Act, 1921, regarding the keeping of Dogs within the City Limits, and within one mile thereof.

**Section 197.**—The owner of every dog or bitch kept within the city limits or within one mile thereof in any direction, which is six months old or upwards shall register such dog or bitch at the City Hall on or before the first day of July of each year, and shall pay to the City Clerk such fees as the Council may determine, for the uses of the city.

**Section 198.**—The City Clerk shall supply such registered owner with a metal tag for each dog or bitch registered, with the number of registration stamped thereon, and the owner of every registered dog or bitch shall keep on such dog or bitch a collar with the tag attached thereto.

**Section 199.**—No owner shall allow any dog or bitch to run at large in the City unaccompanied by some person in charge thereof, the owner shall see that the same is securely housed between the hours of 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

**Section 200.**—The owner of dog or bitch who contravenes or fails to comply with the foregoing sections shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding five dollars.

## The Clinical Society of Medicine

Lands Both in Court

"The woman is mad jealous of me," said the seventy-year-old better half of a 39-year-old woman in the Magistrate's Court this morning in trying to explain the circumstances of an assault charged by the wife.

She told the court he had caught her by the throat.

The fact was, the husband said, he was a cabman and his wife was mad jealous of every woman or girl he drove. Jealousy, he said, was the whole cause of the trouble and the judge told them to go home and live like Christian people.

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
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
