At the Britannia Park athletic and bicycle games this week it was very noticeable that several of the handicappers failed to get away from the mark, thus losing the advantage of their handicaps.

For the benefit of the men and boys competing at these games, Prof. Barton offers a few suggestions on "How to start."

A ready mind is a strong factor in making a man successful in getting away. Many a "sprint" has been won by the ability of an athlete to concentrate his mind and at the crack of the pistol to bound away from the mark. The crouch is the best one to use, for an athlete is less likely to make a false start than where he uses the standing start.

The thumbs and middle fingers are placed on the scratch, leaving the width of the shoulders between the hands. Holes are made for the feet as near the scratch as the athlete finds practicable. This distance will vary for the first or front foot, from six to eight inches, and for the rear foot from fifteen to twenty-five inches, according to the proportional length of the leg and back.

The idea is to have all fours on the ground and to be braced ready for the spring, but the higher the body the better, for it will take less strength, and what is more important, less time to shoot it into the proper position for running. At the word "set" the athlete braces strongly on his spikes and swings loosely forward, feeling the centre of gravity nearly above the scratch. The first stride throws the body forward, and by the second or third the athlete is in the normal position for running.

A series of short dashes from ten to twenty yards should be part of every day's exercise. The ability to start quickly can only be acquired by constant practice.

GEO. LYON LOST AT ROCHESTER.

Rochester, July 17.—George S. Lyon, of Toronto, Canada, champion, and holder of the individual championship golf title for 1908 in the League of the Lower Lakes, lost his chance yesterday to play in the semi-finals for the individual championship on the links of the Rochester Country Club. Laird, of Toronto, is a very likely candidate, indeed, for the title, as he defeated Lyon yesterday afternoon in the second round of the contest by 1 up, the latter being backed to win in the finals.

Laird will play with Standish, of Detroit, winner of the northern and southern amateur championship at Pinehurst this season, who defeated Rowbottom, of Toronto, in the second round by 1 up. Standish won against Cochran, of Toronto, 2 up in the first round.

Legge, of Toronto, and G. T. Curtis, of Rochester, played a very interesting contest in the second round for the individual championship. The Rochester man was 1 up.

In the first round of the individual championship, Lyon, of Toronto, won against Cassels, also of Toronto, 5 up and 4 to play. Faust, of Buffalo, won against Masten, of Toronto, 2 up and 1 to go in the first round of the consolation championship, and Smyth, of Toronto, defeated Macklem, of Toronto, 5 up and 4 to go in the first round of the consolation championship. Smyth was defeated by F. Will, of Rochester, 3 up and 2 to go in the second round.

In the contest between Lyon and Laird of Toronto, Lyon won the first in 5, the second in 5, the third in 4, and Lyon the fourth, all even. Laird won the fifth in 6, the sixth was halved in 4, Laird winning the seventh in 4, 2 up. The eighth was halved. Laird won the ninth in 3, 3 up. Laird got the tenth in 5. Lyon got the next in 5, the twelfth in 3; the next was halved in 4, the fourteenth in 5. Laird won the fifteenth for a dormie 3. Lyon laid a dormie 2 at the sixteenth. Lyon got the next in 3, and the eighteenth was halved in 5.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 17.—Threatening weather did not cause any decrease in the attendance at Fort Erie yesterday afternoon. The improved track was responsible for good racing, in which the finishes were close and aroused enthusiasm. The steeplechase, which featured the programme, was one of the best races of this kind seen in this section this season, six of the nine starters going to the first few jumps in almost perfect alignment. The purse went to Berquo, on which McClain put up a splendid riding exhibition to wear down John Dillon. Gault unseated his rider at the first hedge, Harrington at the seventh, and Purslane took a nasty fall at the twelfth fence when apparently going well in hand. None of the riders suffered injury.

The frequent crowding was responsible for several spills, but luckily nothing serious resulted from the falls. C. W. Burt and Cassowary went down in the closing race soon after the barrier was released. Dolly Maddis also came to grief at the start in the fifth race. The narrow track is mostly to blame for the frequent spills at this, the three-quarter start.

The Canadians again miscalled when they installed Canine Maid favorite in the Dominion bred race, Cape Sauce, her recent conqueror, again leading her home.

Mystifier had to be in his best form to land the purse in the third race, for which Ragman was the favorite, as he was crowded sharply soon after the start and had to go all around the others to get up in time to win from Tremargo. There was a big play on the part of the Hamilton contingent on Punky, who finished fourth. Punky ran fairly well for 5 furlongs. He was 8 to 1 in the betting. After the finish of the fourth race, in which Gallant Pirate was the winner, the colt was bid up \$200 over an entered price of \$600 and secured by Wainwright. P. M. Civil claimed Chief Kee out of the same race at a cost of \$900.

Jockey Brooks and J. Howard were each fined \$25 by the judges for rough riding.

Jockey A. Martin, who is under contract to Jas. Robinson, has taken French leave, and his employer wants to warn other owners not to harbor the missing rider.

Starter Dade suspended Jockey Deverich for four days for disobedience at the post. For a similar offence Steeplechase Riders Lynch and Higgins were suspended for the remainder of this meeting. Summary:
