CITY COUNCIL

Westchester Ave. from Buckland Ave. to Queenston St. Outlet Sewer and Disposal Works and Disposal Works be assessed upon the remainder of the district to be served by the system and the City Engineer be and is hereby instructed to prepare a report as required by the Local Improvement Act with estimated cost of work, area of benefit and estimated amount to be assessed thereon for outlets.

Your Committee further recommend that the City Solicitor frame a notice to the Lincoln Electric Company to be forwarded to them on behalf of the Corporation by the City Clerk requiring the Lincoln Electric Company under By-law 1753, granting franchise to the Company, to remove their poles from St. Paul St. between Ontario and Geneva streets and to provide suitable underground conduits for their wires or to use the lanes and alleyways. This action is necessary because the great number of poles and network of wires now located on St. Paul St. are a nuisance and add to the congestion of the street and the removal of these poles and wires, is necessary to provide for the combination street railway and Public Utility system of poles and wires to support the trolley wire and provide an ornamental system of lighting for the street.

Your Committee further recommend that Concrete Curb be constructed as a Local Improvement under Section 5 of the Local Improvement Act on Ottawa St. from Geneva St. to Niagara St.

Your Committee further recommend that the work of sidewalk repairs and re-grading be awarded to Longley and Rymer at 10c per sq. ft. for new sidewalk and 8c for sidewalk raising or lowering. (The cost of this work is covered in the estimates and the arrangement with Longley and Rymer is the same as last year.)

Your Committee further recommend that the application of Walter L. Dearborn to install a gasoline tank and curb pump in front of 41 Haines St. be not granted.

Your Committee further recommend that the permit granted to Albert Devlin, Esq. for a curb pump at No. 3 James St. be and is hereby cancelled and the owner be notified to have same removed from the street forthwith.

Your Committee further recommend that the lots owned by the City on Henrietta St. between Haines St. and Permitta St. be under-drained and levelled for a playground at an estimated cost of \$200 and that the City Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to place that sum to the credit of your Committee for this purpose.

Your Committee further recommend that the application of B. Widdicombe to erect a sign 5 ft. x 1 ft. 2 inches to project over the sidewalk, 10 feet above same, in front of his premises at No. 5 Bond St., be granted.

Your Committee further recommend that the following streets be flushed or sprinkled with water as a Local Improvement and that the cost of same be levied against the properties abutting under the Local Improvement Act.

- Church St.—Ontario St. to Queenston St. King St.—Church St. to Ontario St. James St.—Church St. to St. Paul St. Ontario St.—Midland St. to St. Paul St. Queen St.—Church St. to St. Paul St. St. Paul St.—Geneva St. to Ontario St.

Your Committee further recommend that the following streets be oiled as a Local Improvement and cost of such oiling assessed against the properties abutting.

- St. Paul St. West from Ontario St. to Ligar St. Welland Ave. from Mrs. Shea's lot on Lock Two Hill to Ontario St. Market Grounds from King St. to Church St. Elizabeth St. from Lac St. to George St. Henry St. from Welland Ave. to Russell Ave. Clark St. from Church St. to Welland Ave.

- Thorold Road from Queenston Et. to Lincoln Ave. George St. from Welland Ave. to Russell Ave. Market St. from Helliwell's Lane to James St. Albert St. from Henry St. to Catherine St. Raymond St. from James St. to Clark St. Louisa St. from Lake St. to Catherine St. Edmund St. from Henry St. to Catherine St. Dufferin St. from York St. to George St. Pleasant Ave. from Lake St. to Henry St.

Moved by Ald. Smith, seconded by Ald. Riffer. "That the report of the Board of Works just read, be received and adopted."

report of the Market, Buildings and License Committee:

Your Committee reports that during the month of April building permits to the number of 100 were issued for a total valuation of \$22,300.

Moved by Ald. Dakers seconded by Ald. Hill: That the sixth report of the Market, Buildings and License Committee just read be received and adopted.

CONSERVATION

Ald. Rose presented a verbal report of the Conservation Committee stating he took the matter of the high price of butter up with the Fair Price Commission but under the terms of the law there must be a concrete case of overcharge laid before the Commission before they can make any investigation.

Ald. Westwood—I am glad that Ald. Rose has brought this matter up and I think we should discharge this Committee as it is a farce, a fraud and unfair, but I think something should be done to try and see what can be done to get some things cheaper.

Ald. Riffer: I think if we abolished the Market we would get produce a lot cheaper right at our own doors.

Mayor Elson: This suggestion to discharge the Commission seems rather drastic as the appointment was made in good faith, but the trouble lies in the law governing the Commission which was a carefully and wonderfully made one, for by its terms the Commission is powerless to do anything and I think the criticism if any should be leveled at the Department at Ottawa that was responsible for it.

Ald. Westwood: It was not the Commission I had reference to, but the Act itself.

Mayor Elson: It seems strange that the Government should play to the gallery by creating laws which are of no use.

BY-LAWS

Ald. Eagle and Westwood introduced a by-law to enlarge the time for the return of the collectors roll for 1918, and Ald. Riffer and Dakers submitted a by-law to declare part of Albert Street a residential section. Both by-laws were given three readings and were declared passed.

On motion by Ald. Smith and Riffer, the Mayor was appointed as the City's delegate to the Sixth Canadian Good Roads Convention at Quebec on May 22nd and 23rd.

LOW WEIGHT BREAD

Ald. Hill: Since the 23rd of April I have been keeping a careful tab on the bread sold in this city and I find that every day since the Standard three pound loaf is in most cases three and four ounces short of the required weight. I would like to know if we have an official to look into this or not, and if we have not why let us get one?

Mayor Elson: There is no inspector here but there is one in Hamilton who comes here but I don't know how often. If Ald. Hill has correct information tabulated carefully it is an important matter and should be looked into.

Ald. Hill: I don't think it is done intentionally but is the result of carelessness.

Ald. Riffer: The quicker we make the market a free one and appoint an weights and measures official the sooner we will get a fair weight.

Mayor Elson: Three or four ounces in each loaf shows that a serious condition exists and I feel that it is my duty to report the matter to the proper authorities and have an official sent here to investigate the matter for it is a clear violation of the law.

Ald. Westwood: We should have a man to regulate the scales on the market.

Ald. Smith: I will venture to say that twenty out of twenty five potato dealers on the market will be found to be selling at short weight if an investigation were made.

VICTORIA DAY

Mayor Elson introduced the question of the observance of Victoria Day which this year falls on a Saturday and it is likely that the merchants will petition to have the holiday held on Monday.

Ald. Eagle: Let them consider Friday the main shopping day that week.

Ald. Westwood: The holiday should be held on Monday if Hamilton and Toronto are going to hold it on that day.

Ald. Smith: Saturday is the one day in the week when the merchants expect to do business.

Ald. Eagle: It seems to me to be all nonsense to set another day, Saturday is the logical day for the holiday.

Mayor Elson: The reason I brought the question up is because there was a division of opinion in former years and we want to settle the matter in plenty of time.

Ald. Westwood then gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would introduce a motion to declare Monday, May 26th as the day for celebrating the birthday of the late Queen Victoria. The Council then adjourned.
