HURON & ONTARIO R. R.

A couple of weeks ago we mentioned that there was an agitation going on towards the formation of a company to build a railway from Lake Huron to Lake Ontario, the terminal point at this end being Goderich, and the other being at Hamilton or some suitable place on Lake Ontario.

We are pleased to know that the scheme has been taken hold of and is likely to assume practical shape. This week we publish a notice of application for a charter by the company to the Ontario Legislature, and we also learn that a number of the most prominent residents of some of the towns along the line have been appointed on the directorate, the representation being as follows:—Goderich—Judge Toms, M. C. Cameron, Q. C., J. T. Garrow, Q. C., Joseph Williams, Horace Horton and Dr. Holmes; Blyth—P. Kelly; Brussels—F. C. Rogers; Listowel—Mayor Bricker, J. C. Hay; and W. Milne, Reeve of Grey. From our knowledge of the men who comprise the provisional directorate we feel prepared to state that there is every reason to believe in the bona fides of the scheme. The proposed route will run through one of the most productive and progressive sections of Ontario, and in the event of connection with the Vanderbilt system at Hamilton, would prove a valuable method of traffic east, and a sharp competitor with the G. T. R. We understand offers of assistance from outside parties have been made to the promoters of the new scheme, and on the whole the prospects look bright for the early commencement of actual work on the Huron & Ontario Railway.

A meeting of the provisional directors is being held at Clinton as we go to press.

When a Clinton girl read that dressed hogs were being drawn to market, she remarked that it was time the feelings of ladies who did marketing were considered, and the bare corpses of swine were no longer exposed to the general view.

The Conservative papers have found that saying "Mowat must go" has only apparently tightened his grip upon office. They are now giving a variety to the political slogan, for, *ride the Hamilton Speculator*, it is now "Meredith must go."

The last bulletin issued by the Ontario Department of Agriculture states that the Holstein cow is now being given a trial in a number of the dairies of the province. These black and whites are great milkers, if we are to believe everything that is said in their favor, but there are those who aver that the milk is deficient in that particular quality essential to the

manufacture of a large quantity of first-class butter in proportion to the flow, and it remains to be proved whether the animals are suited to the production of good cheese as compared with the Ayrshires, the Durhams and their grades, and even the old and reliable common cow, who is not yet out of the lists as a favorite with some dairymen. We shall watch with interest the success or otherwise of the Holstein as handled on the average farm of our own province, where fancy feeding is not the rule. A Kentucky dairymen recently described the Holstein cow as "A cross between a Jersey and a pump."

A LIBRARY was, under the patronage of "Josiah L. Bemis," has been writing some letters to the *Globe* on the religious education of our youth. He mounts the chariot on which Rev. Dr. Sutherland would ride into place, and power, and lashes the steed in a way that the poor Protestant horse has never speeded to for many a long year. That nag is so accustomed to receive vigorous prodding that it can scarcely doubt that it is not in satire but in grim earnest that the jocular Josiah is showing it beyond its gait and even to the astonishment of its friends. The Bemis letters have turned out to be the best sell in the shape of political literature penned for many a day. The mask was so neatly fitted that only a small number could penetrate the disguise until the last letter was written, and some are still in doubt. Mr. Bemis is a delightful literary and political fraud, and must chuckle over the manner in which he has so cleverly deceived both sides in his well simulated Quixotic screeds.

If the State must provide hangmen, they should be of the best. If the sheriffs do not want to do the job themselves, let them have their proxies practise on dummy figures until the success of the dreadful act is assured.

A public hangman, skilled in his ghastly work, is a necessity while the mode of capital punishment is the horrible and disgusting method practised at Guelph. Harvey could have done infinitely better himself, had he been given the opportunity. When the law says a man must die at a certain hour by a certain mode why not permit the doomed man to help to make his exit as easy as possible, rather than trust to the hand of an ignorant and unfeeling wretch who, in this latest case, must have had more of the murderous instinct in him than the unfortunate fellow whose over-refined sentiments compelled him, from love and not hate, to take the lives of those he loved not wisely but certainly deeply? If the gallows does not go as a mode of public execution, then the blundering amateur hangman must.

A Word or two About New Publications That Have Come to Hand.
THE HURON SIGNAL FOR DECEMBER, 1889.

The thirtieth volume does well. It has four illustrated articles—describing Paris during the Exposition, a visit to Cyprus and the Levant, and notes of travel in Spain; Christmas Stories and Poems and other Christmas readings. A paper on the Epworth League Movement, and other articles, make up an excellent number.

ties in this County, including the County Council grants for the same purpose, for the year 1888, was the sum of \$5,555.91. To this must be added about \$1,600 in each year, or \$400 per quarter, paid by the County for the maintenance of indigent persons in the County Gaol, or a total expenditure of about \$6,800 for relief purposes alone, out of the public chest. In this statement no account is taken of the very large amount expended in private charity, which if there was a Poor House would be much reduced. So that, apparently, we are actually expending more now for our indigent and very unsatisfactory service than we would if we had a County Poor House costing us \$6,000 a year. But, putting aside for the moment all our present expenditure, which we think would be largely saved, the actual expense of a County Poor House is a mere trifle, if the burden is evenly borne by all the ratepayers.

The last revised assessment of the whole County was about \$30,000,000. If the annual charge for a Poor House is put at \$6,000, this would impose an annual obligation upon each farmer assessed at only \$400 of only 30 cents. Surely it is a liberal upon the rural ratepayer to suggest that he is hostile upon the mere ground of the necessary expense involved. But, aside from the expense of the removal of the indigent, the speedy establishment, at some convenient point in the County, of the long desired and much needed Poor House.

We might say more, but we hope we have said enough to induce you, sir, to take the matter up earnestly, and to aid by any means reasonably within your power in securing immediate action by the next County Council, in the establishment of a County Poor House, in which the County poor, the aged, the friendless, the imbecile, the unfortunate poor and needy public support, in their distress as their more fortunate fellows, the taxpaying citizens, out of their abundance can well afford to give them.
