### BIG BLAZE AT MONCTON. MONCTON, March 28.

Only the exceptionally fine work of the local fire department prevented wholesale conflagration this morning, when the combined warehouse and machine shop of the Record Foundry and Machine Company was completely destroyed by fire. With a strong gale blowing, the huge warehouse was in a few minutes a raging furnace, and with showers of sparks and blazing embers driven through the air in a northeasterly direction. wooden buildings within several blocks were in jeopardy. # REVOLTS SUPPRESSED.

HALLE, Germany, March 28. Eisleben is quiet and the town is under control of the police. Reports from Bitterfeld say authorities have suppressed revolts. The only fighting has, been near Sangerhausen, where a workmen's armoured train was held up and an engagement ensued, a few men being killed or wounded. Workmen still have the upper hand in Leuna, the police showing no intention to attack them for fear that the big factories will be blown up, which the workmen threaten. At Halle the situation is quiet, this, according to the police, being due to a postponement of Commun-ist plans, which provide for the capture of surrounding towns first.
