GRAND TRUNK WORKS AT STRATFORD.—The Herald supplies the following information regarding the improvements and alterations rendered necessary at Stratford by the change of gauge...

The new shops, freight sheds, machinery, &c., which have been built, cost about \$30,000. A large open shed for transhipping freight, six hundred feet long, and one hundred feet wide, has been built...

Another shed contains the engine and machinery of the nitting elevator, a powerful lever appliance for raising passenger and freight cars, while the wheels are being adjusted.

A large engine will be placed in these new shops, and over 200 men employed. These new buildings are all erected at the east end of the station. A powerful iron elevator, for raising Pullman Palace cars, is placed in position in the yard. It is a monster in proportions, and is the invention, we understand, of Mr. Eaton, Locomotive Superintendent.

NOVEL WAY OF CATCHING RATS.—The Hamilton Spectator says:—A very interesting performance was witnessed in the James street market this morning. A boy, some twelve years of age, was engaged in catching the rats which abound in hundreds under the fish stalls...

He had, at the end of a piece of string, about three feet in length, a fish hook, which he baited with a piece of meat and threw it under the sidewalk. It would not be there many seconds before he would feel a tugging at the string, when he would, with great care, pull up and to the astonishment of the bystanders who were eagerly watching the sport, display a large-sized rat, with the hook fastened in its mouth.

The work of killing the vermin would then be but the matter of a few moments. In this manner we saw two rats killed within ten minutes.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT PORT ELGIN.—A serious accident occurred on Saturday night, about 7 o'clock, on the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway, about two and a half miles from Port Elgin. The gravel train was coming in when a man by the name of Buehan being on the track, the tender ran over him, crushing his legs to a jelly and bruising him in other parts of his body so that he only lived until 11 p. m. on Saturday.
