## LONDON AND PRECINCTS.

Mr. John Stewart, of Embro, is attending the Collegiate Institute in this city.

Miss Fannie Silcox, of Frome, is in this city visiting friends and attending the Moody meetings.

Walter C. Morgan, of Buffalo, is visiting friends in this city. He is engaged on another new story.

Rev. Father William, who has for the past twelve years held the pastorate of Chatham, has been recalled to Cincinnati by the Superior of the Franciscan Order.

St. George's Literary Society gives another of its open meetings on Monday evening. Some of the best talent in the city has been secured, and promises to draw a large crowd.

Mr. Robt. Campbell, sen., of the Hamilton Pottery, has been in the city for the last day or two. He was delighted with the Moody meetings. Mr. Campbell was an intimate acquaintance of Rev. Mr. Langford when he lived in Hamilton 30 years ago.

There will be three eclipses, two of the sun and one of the moon, this year, but none of them will be visible in this section. There will be a lunar eclipse, that is a new contact of the moon with the earth's shadow on June 23, visible in North and South America.

On account of Mr. Moody holding evangelistic services in London this week, the village pastors thought it advisable to postpone the week of prayer in this village, as they wished to attend some of the meetings in London. Quite a number intend to go and hear the celebrated evangelist.—Embro Courier.

Mr. Fred Schwartz, advance manager of the Wood-St. John Old English Comedy Company, is in this city. The company will be at the Grand Opera House on Tuesday and Wednesday next and go from here to Detroit and Chicago. Marguerite St. John presented "As in a Looking-Glass" here last season and pleased her audience very much.

The special revival work begun in St. Mary's a little over a week ago, by Messrs. Crossley and Hunter, terminated on Sunday evening. A desire to meet Mr. Moody, who is in this city this week, led them to close their labors in that town sooner than they would otherwise have done. Unseasonable weather and bad roads deterred a great many people, especially in the rural sections, from attending the services.

The remains of the late John C. Maclean, of the Toronto World, were consigned to their last resting place in Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Toronto, yesterday afternoon. The pall-bearers were the three brothers of deceased, W. F. James Hector and Wallace Maclean, H. E. Smallpiece, Dr. Andrew Eadie, and Arthur Findlay, of London. The funeral was largely attended by writers for the daily and weekly press, besides professional and business men.

Dr. Woodruff says that a number of cases of inflammation of the lungs have resulted from some of the newspapers recommending quinine and whisky as a remedy for "la grippe." The action of quinine is

to make the lungs very susceptible to a fresh cold, and to take indiscriminately applied doses is decidedly dangerous. People who carry a supply of quinine capsules or similar remedies and tender them to their friends should bear in mind that the remedy may be more dangerous than the disease.

Mr. Anson Paul, one of the pioneer settlers of London, Ont., is in Chicago visiting his son, Mr. E. T. Paul, the well-known real estate dealer and the owner of the great Wilmette settlement northwest of the city. Mr. Paul first became a resident of St. Thomas, Ont., in 1832. He has been a resident of London for 46 years, and up to twenty years ago was engaged in the wholesale grocery business. He is now 90 years of age, and is as hale and hearty as many men his junior.—[British-American (Chicago).]

A Harvey's petition to allow the erection of a frame addition to his spice mills on Talbot street, was granted. After the usual accounts had passed, Ald. Wallace moved, seconded by Ald. Bartlett, a vote of thanks to the Chairman for his impartial ruling in the committee during the past year. Carried.

Ald. Boyd responded in suitable terms and the meeting adjourned.

Sixty Per Cent. of London Affected. "Good morning," said an ADVERTISER man-around-town to Dr. T. V. Hutchinson, medical health officer. "What do you think of this influenza epidemic?"

"It's wonderful."

"To what extent do you suppose the disease exists in the city?"

"Well, I should estimate that about 60 per cent. of the whole city is more or less affected."

"A good, strong imagination is the worst feature of some cases."

"Well, perhaps so; but the city is thoroughly in the hands of the Russian influenza."

"Do you consider it a dangerous disease?"

"It is dangerous in this way. It leads to bronchitis, inflammation and pneumonia—serious diseases. The 'grippe' itself I do not consider virulent."

Keenly Contested. One of the most spirited contests which has taken place in municipal affairs was that of councilors in the township of East Nissouri, Ward No. 1, between Mr. Hope Webster, an old London boy, and Mr. Wm. Oliver, of Kintore. Notwithstanding the

state of the roads and the inclemency of the weather, nearly every voter was brought to the polls. Previous to the election both men were weighed in the balance and were found wanting on the opposite side. When the result was obtained giving Oliver a majority of 14 in Kintore division and Webster a majority of 97 in Thamesford, leaving a grand bonus of 43 for Hope, the result almost paralyzed his opponents and at the same time his supporters were highly satisfied with the victory. Mr. Webster is a comparatively young man in Oxford, having been born in London township, and during his short time amongst us has, by his genial disposition and uprightness of character, made many warm friends. Mr. Oliver, his opponent, is an old and one of the most respected men in the township, all the more satisfactory. The people of Thamesford honored their candidate with bonfires, speeches, parade of the band, followed by the largest majority of his supporters. The strife for the reeve's chair was between Mr. D. R. Calder and Mr. J. G. McLeod. This contest was also very keen, but the former was elected by nearly 100 majority.
