Grand Lodge Proceedings—Satisfactory

Reports—Election of Officers.

Woodstock, June 17.—The Grand Lodge
of the Canadian Order of Oddfellows con-
vened here yesterday in the Buckingham
Hotel, Grand Master Collins in the chair.
Mayor Douglas, accompanied by several
prominent citizens, on behalf of the Town
Council and Board of Trade extended to
the grand officers and delegates the freedom
of the town. Grand Master Collins replied
in felicitous terms.

At 7 p.m. an imposing street parade took
