

DROWNED IN DETROIT RIVER

Young Boy Loses His Life Before His Father's Eyes.

Old Man of 91 Killed by Falling Into a Cellar.

HIS LAST FISH.

Detroit, Sept. 3.—"Oh, papa! I've got a fish and he's a whopper!" With this exclamation, 10-year-old Tommie Campbell sprang up from where he had been sitting on the wharf near Keith's coal dock at the foot of Twenty-first street. In his excitement he stepped off the wharf and an instant later was out of sight in the river. He came to the surface once, and the agonized father sprang into the water to assist him, but the lad sunk before he could reach him and did not reappear. The father, Archibald Campbell, was helped to the wharf, and half an hour later the body was recovered by a man who dived from the dock. The two had been fishing for some time and were about to quit when the fatal accident occurred.

FELL INTO THE CELLAR.

Detroit, Sept. 3.—George Klein, of Hamtramck, fell into a cellar and died yesterday noon from the injuries received by the fall. Friday night the cellar door had been left open, probably through carelessness, and Mr. Klein, unaware of danger, fell a distance of ten feet. He never regained his senses and lingered until yesterday noon. He received a severe concussion of the brain and suffered internal injuries. Mr. Klein is undoubtedly the oldest citizen of Hamtramck. He was 91 years of age and was born in France in 1807.

SUICIDE IDENTIFIED.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 4.—A young woman who committed suicide here Friday night by drinking a quantity of carbolic acid has been identified as Stella Williamson, who for a time was employed as a chambermaid at the Hotel. She was regarded as somewhat demented, and that together with her disappointment at not securing employment at the Empire Theatre, at which she applied during the day, is thought to have been the cause of her rash act.

10-YEAR-OLD DROWNED.

Montreal, Sept. 4.—George Lamarche, the 10-year-old son of Mr. George Lamarche, shoemaker, Maisonneuve, was bathing in the river at Longue Point on Thursday afternoon, when he went beyond his depth and was drowned.

A FATAL SHOT.

Uxbridge, Ont., Sept. 4.—Thos. Armstrong, the young man who was accidentally hit with a bullet from the rifle of young Mann, on Aug. 21, died Saturday morning. The doctors held out no hope from the first, as the bullet passed completely through the body. The shooting was purely accidental, Armstrong being about half a mile from Millman and at the other side of a hill.

LADY TEACHER MISSING.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 3.—Miss Maud Wallbrook, of this city, who has a position in the Red Deer Industrial School, went out for a walk last Sunday night. She has not yet returned, nor can any trace of her be found.

SOMNAMBULIST'S FATE.

New York, Sept. 3.—James Gibbons, aged 35, a somnambulist, fell through an air shaft, five stories, while walking in his sleep this morning. He was dead when picked up. The doctors had been a sleep-walker for years. He made many trips over the rooftops, and in other dangerous places while unconscious, but never before met any injury.

DIED WHILE WAITING FOR A STEAMER.

Toronto, Sept. 3.—While sitting on Milloy's wharf, waiting for the steamer Corona, about 4:30 yesterday afternoon, P. Falkie, a Buffalo citizen, suddenly fell forward on his face and expired instantly. The wharf was crowded with excursionists from the United States and Canadian pleasure resorts, who were arriving or leaving on the various boats. Deceased was about 60 years old.

FATAL TAG GAME.

New York, Sept. 2.—Six-year-old Melville White, of No. 505 West Fifty-seventh street, died in the Roosevelt Hospital this morning from injuries received while playing a game of "tag." Chasing a companion across Tenth avenue, near Fifty-seventh street, last night, the lad was run over by a horse car and terribly hurt. Although spectators say the car driver was not to blame for the accident, he was arrested.

THE WORLD'S LAWYERS.

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 2.—There was a very small attendance at the second day's session of the International Law Association conference this morning, less than 25 delegates and few spectators being present when the session was opened. The majority of the members of the American Bar Association have left for their homes.

A paper on "Law Suited to Subject People," by Dr. J. F. Tompkins, M.A., of London, was read. In speaking of the United States and the Philippine question, Dr. Tompkins strongly upheld the policy of the American people. He said it was the God-given duty of a great people to carry the benefits of a higher civilization to other lands, and to inferior peoples. Were Washington, Jefferson and Hamilton living today, they would cry "Glory, glory," at the triumph of the Americanist over the Philippines.

The next paper was on "Liens of Privileged Claims on Property," by Judges Raikes, of London.

McLEAN'S KNIFE

He Has It Well Sharpened for President McKinley.

Murat Halstead Calls His Audience "Traitors"—No Fight, But a Hot Time.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Sept. 2.—The nomination of John R. McLean for governor by the Democratic state convention of Ohio is a matter that concerns the Democrats of the whole country, for it is a step in the prearranged campaign of certain Democratic leaders against the renomination of W. J. Bryan, in 1900. It is the confident belief of the most astute politicians that while Goebel, the Democratic nominee for governor of Kentucky, and McLean are both professedly followers of Mr. Bryan, they are a part of the movement which includes Richard Croker and Tammany Hall; Gorman and his Maryland machine, and Harrison and the Chicago machine to make Bryan's renomination impossible.

FIVE BIG STATES BUNCHED.
It will be found, say the political prophets, that the delegations from New York, Maryland, Ohio, Illinois and Kentucky will be for John McLean for president in 1900. Nominally, they will carry credentials as Bryan men, but this will enable them all the more effectively to execute their treasonable purposes.

There will be no division of the party in Ohio, and there will be no objection from the Democrats of that state to the coming of Mr. Bryan, but the election of Goebel and McLean, would, they believe, insure beyond a doubt the defeat of Mr. Bryan in his efforts to secure the nomination of the Democratic National Convention next year, for it will insure for McLean the combined vote of Ohio and Kentucky in the convention.

"TRAITORS."

Editor Murat Halstead lectured Thursday, by invitation, before the Economic Club. Mr. Halstead's subject was "The Philippines." After the lecture, Mr. Halstead was pelted with questions. One of the questioners, at which she applied during the day, is thought to have been the cause of her rash act. "I hope Otis will be kept and keep on blundering until he and the whole army are driven into the sea or captured," Mr. Halstead said. "A man with those sentiments is a traitor to his country." Several men jumped up and remarked: "Two-thirds of this audience thinks that way." Mr. Halstead replied: "Who ever thinks that way is a traitor." Then there was a rush down the hall with raised fists toward Mr. Halstead, but a great number of them were during that campaign. On the new questions we are gaining steadily. The Chicago platform at the convention next year will be reaffirmed entire. In fact, I doubt whether any opposition to the platform will manifest itself in the convention at all. Two of the greatest of the new issues before the country are, first the trusts; second, the Philippine question.

"The first question can scarcely be called new; but the trusts have been so multiplied that question assumes an importance which it did not have in 1899."

"Many methods have been suggested for the extermination of the trusts. The most feasible, it seems to me, is to require every corporation to obtain a license from the federal government before it is permitted to do business outside the state in which organized. This license can be granted under conditions which will squeeze the water out of the stock and prevent the monopolization of any industry. This nation must choose between being a republic or an empire. An imperial policy cannot be defended on any ground."

HALF A PEANUT

Caused the Death of a Baby at Grand Rapids.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Sept. 4.—Burketa, the 18-months-old child of Frank Kialber, died very suddenly under distressing circumstances. The child had been playing in the afternoon with some children in the neighborhood, and they had some peanuts. The baby ate some of them, and was taken with a fit of coughing, and when brought home was apparently in agony. A physician was called in and an operation performed, but the child died. A post-mortem was held, and a half-kernel of the nut was found in one of the tracheal tubes.

SANG "JOHN BROWN"

Crowd Did So at Reburial of Brown's Men at North Elba, N. Y.

North Elba, N. Y., Sept. 4.—About 3,500 people joined in singing "John Brown's Body" at the reburial of the men of the old Brown farm attendant on the reburial of seven of the followers of the hero of Harper's Ferry.

Capt. J. H. Holmes, who was with Brown in the battle of Chancellorsville, Col. Richard Hinton, Bishop Potter, and Whitelaw Reid all made speeches. The funeral procession was under a military escort from the Twenty-sixth United States Infantry from Plattsburg.

LADIES' DAY AT THE INDUSTRIAL

The Cooler Weather Favorable for Cattle—Results of the Races.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 2.—This was Ladies' Day at the Industrial Fair. The weather was cool and pleasant, and the attendance much larger than on Friday. Large numbers of visitors came by boat and the early trains, and the grounds resumed their wonted appearance. The ladies were attracted by the splendid exhibit of ladies' work in the main building, and the farmers by the horse and cattle parades and the judging of the respective classes.

The cattle were all reported healthy, and there was a general concurrence of opinion that with the cooler weather and a greater care in feeding no further fatalities would occur. President Withrow also stated that though Dr. Andrew Smith had not officially reported on the death of the cattle on the previous day, he had expressed the opinion that the hot weather and over-feeding were responsible for the loss of these animals.

The sports in front of the grand stand consisted of two good running races, the open trot, or pace, and bicycle races for girls, old men and a novice. All the events were run off without mishap, and the ladies were remarkably good considering the condition of the track after the rain.

DRUGGISTS, BEWARE!

Warning Against Selling Liquor as a Beverage.

Toronto, Sept. 3.—The license department of the Ontario Government has furnished the license inspectors with the following circular: "Representations have been made to this branch to the effect that very many of the druggists throughout the province do not comply with the provisions of the law, and are in the habit of selling liquor as a beverage. I am directed by the provincial treasurer to bring this matter to your notice, and to express the hope that you will give the matter your special attention, and see that there are no further grounds for complaint in your district."

FOUND HIS BROTHER

Johnston went to the performance, and after it was over stood around looking at things, and ran up against a man, an employee of the show, who turned out to be a long-lost brother, one he had not seen before for ten years.

He applied for a position with the show, secured it, and the two brothers went off together. Johnston left behind at Dr. Gustin's a bicycle he rented or borrowed from someone.

THE HORRORS OF STARVATION

Terrible Experience of a Shipwrecked Norwegian Crew.

Eight Men Swept Overboard—Three Perished on a Raft—One Went Crazy—Remainder Drove Lots as to Who Should Be Eaten.

Charleston, S. C., Sept. 3.—The British steamer Woodruff, Capt. Milbrun, arrived from Hamburg, yesterday, Aug. 31, 250 miles south of Charleston, the Woodruff picked up Maurice Anderson and Goodmund Thomsen, survivors of the Norwegian bark Drot, wrecked Aug. 15, off the Florida coast. The Drot was bound from Pascoagoula to Buenos Ayres. Anderson is a raving maniac, and his companion is shockingly mutilated from bites of the crazed man. Thomsen tells a dreadful story. The captain of the Drot and seven men were swept overboard and lost in the recent West Indian hurricane. The mate and seven other men put to sea on a raft made from decking. The raft parted soon after and the mate and one man were separated from the others. The mate's companion was landed at Philadelphia by the German steamer Titania, on Aug. 22. He stated that the mate committed suicide.

Of the six men on the other part of the raft, one became crazed from exposure, and jumped into the sea. The others exhausted from suffering, fell overboard and were lost. Anderson, Thomsen and a German seaman drew lots as to which should be eaten, as none of them had a mouthful of food. Life and death were the lot of the German. He was killed and the blood was sucked from his veins by the two survivors.

Soon after Anderson lost his reason and savagely attacked his only companion. Thomsen's breast and face were bitten in several places, chunks of good size being torn out. Both men are now at the city hospital, and the Norwegian consul has taken the case in hand. Thomsen is a native of Stevanger, Norway.

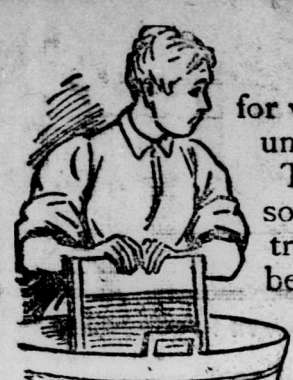
