Sharkey Knocked Out by Ruhl
—London Ball Team Loses to Chatham—Bay City Will Likely Take Grand Rapids' Place in the International.

LOST TO CHATHAM.

London's easy win from Chatham on Monday gave them an overdue confidence, and yesterday they were turned down in a style by the visitors. Chatham's star twirler, Andy Thompson, who hails from Woodstock, was in the box for the outsiders, and was one too many for the local batsmen. He pitched a great ball, and was especially effective at critical points of the game. Wiggs, who did the slab work for the home team, was in good form, and only allowed the visitors seven hits, three of them made by Grimshaw, formerly with London. Errors were responsible for four of the Chatham's six runs, and Grimshaw's homer another. The sixth was given to them by Wiggs, who issued a pass, made a wild pitch, and the next man up singled. The visitors scored in the second inning on a wild throw of Radcliffe's and Lohman let a ball go through him a little later, costing another tally. Pete repeated the same performance in the seventh, and the cost was the same, another run. Wiggs steadied right down, and kept the visitors guessing. In the third inning, with three men on bases, he struck out the last man, and in the seventh, with the bases all filled, he struck out the last two men. Neal, who covers the left pasture for the Chathams, is one of the best fielders in the league. He had six difficult chances, without an error, covering all kinds of ground. The score:

RUHLIN PUT SHARKEY TO SLEEP.

Seaside A. C., Coney Island, New York, June 26.—For the first time in his pugilistic career Tom Sharkey went down to decisive defeat tonight in the historic arena of the Seaside A. C., and big Gus Ruhl, the Ohio pugilist, was his conqueror. It was a clean knock-out that came after fifteen rounds of fight that made a memorable ring battle. Save in the matter of aggressiveness, Ruhl led from the start off in every feature of the game, and at all times had the fight well in hand. Sharkey did not give up his place in the line of the first-class heavy-weights without a desperate struggle. In the fifth round Tom was first up. He closed, but Gus sent him away with short left and right jolts on the head. Tom looked tired, and Gus followed him and jabbed his head back and crossed his right arm to the jaw. Tom staggered, and Ruhl stepped in and banged him with both hands, until the sailor staggered to the floor. He was up at the count, but unable to make a defense, he again heaved to the ground. Ruhl stepped in and with bulldog gameness he struggled again to his feet. Gus by this time was hardly able to use his hands, but when Tom again regained his feet he staggered to the game and after short left and right jolts to the head, that looked as if they would not hurt a child. But Tom was so badly done for that he again went down under them. Again Tom rose blindly to his feet, and thus allowed Ruhl to clinch him, and with a straight left to the face, and right uppercut to the jaw Tom toppled forward, all out, and Referee Johnny White waved Ruhl to his corner. The sailor pugilist's seconds carried him to his corner, where he gradually revived and was soon able to leave the ring.
