OUR TORONTO LETTER.

The Single Tax Movement at the Two Capitals.

An Assessment Commissioner Recommends its Adoption—It Would Reduce Taxation, Provide Work for the Unemployed and Bring General Prosperity.

(Specially Communicated.)

TORONTO, Jan. 19, 1893.
The capital of our Dominion is distinguishing itself, through its Board of Trade, as the appreciation of economic truth. Mr. A. Pratt, the assessment commissioner of the city of Ottawa, is a thorough-going single taxer. Last week he brought the question before the Ottawa Board of Trade. The Ottawa Evening Journal devotes two columns to a report of the proceedings, under the following headings:
"Urges a Great Change—Assessment Commissioner Booms the Single Tax—It Would Mean Life and Progress to the City—In Place of Wood-Grown Lots Would Grow Up Handmade Houses—Taxes Would Be Reduced, Work Provided for the Unemployed, and General Prosperity Reign."
The Journal prints the paper in full, and says: "It was so well received by the members of the board that on motion of Mr. Magee it was decided to print Mr. Pratt's remarks in full for the use of the Board, and afterwards to appoint a special meeting for the purpose of having the whole question fully discussed."

Mr. Pratt's paper contained the following pertinent "Questions for the board":
1. Ought a man to be taxed for improving the city and giving employment to labor?
2. Is it better to tax men for building houses, stores, manufactories, etc., or to tax speculators for growing weeds and thistles?
3. Does not idle land mean idle men?
4. Why should settlers be forced to seek homes in the back woods, while thousands of acres of unused or half used land lies near the centers of civilization?
5. Do not the many unused lots increase the cost of streets, sewers, lighting, protection; and hence our higher taxes?
6. Why not seek our taxes where the speculator gathers his riches; namely, from land values?
7. When a man gets \$1,000,000 by land speculation, who has got to pay it? Did not some people who honestly earned that money have to lose it?
8. Public improvements raise the value of land. Then why should not the value of land pay for public improvements?
9. Would industry and commerce have to pay tribute to land speculators if taxes were confined to land values?
10. Would coal companies, phosphate companies, mica companies, salt companies, etc., be able to hold valuable lands idle and keep men out of employment if taxes were removed from improvements and imposed on land values?
11. If you tax houses and goods do not you make them harder to get?
12. You tax whisky to make it harder to get, because it is an injury. What is the sense of taxing houses and goods, thus making them harder to get?
13. Why should the man who uses land beneficially be taxed more than the man who holds it idle?
14. Is not the value of the land of a county or city caused by the whole population, and should not that value therefore belong to the whole population?
15. Increased population requires increased taxation. Increased population causes increased land values. Is not the increased land value in every way suited to satisfy the increase in taxation?

LOOKING AROUND AT PROGRESS.
A meeting of the Toronto Single Tax Association was held a few evenings ago at Richmond Hall, the president, Mr. A. C. Campbell, in the chair. The theme of most of the speakers was the progress of the movement. Among the points referred to were the recent vote in the New South Wales Parliament in favor of single tax; the cheering news from Ottawa; the fact that Toronto had retained the ownership of her waterfront in the late arrangements with the railways; and the receiving back of Dr. McGlynn into the Roman Catholic Church without any recantation of his single tax views. It was

remarked that this may be an indication that the Catholic Church is going to help the economic emancipation of the masses with the mighty power of her vast influence, or at any rate that she will no longer oppose radical measures in dealing with the land question.

Congratulatory reference was made to the fact that the New York Standard had found a strong and worthy successor in the Weekly Courier of St. Louis. The Courier is at the head of a syndicate of nearly 40 single tax newspapers, to which it sends plate matter.

It was announced that Louis Post, of New York, would speak in Association Hall, Toronto, on Friday, Jan. 27.

At the request of the chairman, Mr. O. Hudson gave some details of the work that he had charge of in sending deputations to facilitate the discussion of the free trade and the single tax amongst the labor unions and similar bodies. He was warmly complimented on what had been accomplished.
