WHAT THE WESTERN FAIR



Today is "Farmers' Day" at the Western Fair, and the occasion provides sex farmer is scarcely realized until one has visited the Western Fair. Let us see what the fair would be without the farmer. The above picture, drawn to a scale, accurately represents the relative size of the agricultural community and the urban community of Middlesex County. London, of course, is not included in the calculation. But even were London's 40,000 people added to the urban population of the county, the latter would still be dwarfed by the agricultural community by nearly 2,000 souls. According to the census returns of last year the rural population of Middlesex County is 65,065, while the dwellers in towns and villages number only 23,645. FLOWER EXHIBITS MAGNIFICENT

Horticultural Building Never Had More Gorgeous Displays.

The horticultural building is this year a veritable garden of beauty, with its banks of palms and flowering plants and tables laden with cut flowers of every description, to say nothing of the masses of glowing autumn fruits. The chief exhibitors of cut flowers

are Mrs. Burns, of St. Marys; John S. Welch, A. J. Roberts and Thomas Dawes, of Stratford; and J. C. Mills, Miss Partridge, E. Wells and Richard Fletcher, London. Taken as a whole the display of cut flowers is unusually fine, better, indeed, than it has ever been before, al-

though some kinds of flowers are not quite as plentiful this year, owing to the cool, wet weather. This is the case with the gladioli, which are not as good as last year, and is true also of the sweet peas, although the latter are remarkably good, considering the time of the year and the kind of weather we have had.
