WHAT THE WESTERN FAIR REALLY REPRESENTS.



Today is "Farmers' Day" at the Western Fair, and the occasion provides some food for thought. The extent, the wealth and the power of the Middlesex farmer is scarcely realized until one has visited the Western Fair. Let us see what the fair would be without the farmer. The above picture, drawn to a scale, accurately represents the relative size of the agricultural community and the urban population of Middlesex County. London, of course, is not included in the calculation. But even were London's 40,000 people added to the urban population of the county, the latter would still be dwarfed by the agricultural community by nearly 2,000 souls. According to the census returns of last year the rural population of Middlesex County is 65,065, while the dwellers in towns and villages number only 23,645. If London's 40,000 were added to these last figures, the total urban population would still be less than the rural. Great is the Middlesex farmer. Without his presence the Western Fair could close its gates; its usefulness would be to a great extent gone.

THOUSANDS OF OUT-OF-TOWN VISITORS ATTEND THE WESTERN FAIR TUESDAY

Veterans' Day Was Marked by One of the Largest Crowds in the History of the Exhibition.

Train Service Inadequate to Handle People.

ALL DEPARTMENTS COMPLETE
Grand Stand Attendance Yesterday Was Exceptionally Large and the Attractions Excellent.

Not in many years has London, the hospitable metropolis of Western Ontario, entertained so many guests as are at present within her gates. Contrary to the predictions of the ubiquitous pessimist, the Western Fair, far from having gone to seed, is a greater attraction for sightseers than ever. One had only to join in the rush for the exhibition grounds yesterday to become convinced of this. The day was the one set aside by the directors as "Veterans' Day," but the attendance wasn't confined to veterans. Not only was the city and Middlesex County well represented, but thousands came from every corner of Western Ontario. The Michigan Central Railway report having handled 500 people from St. Thomas alone, a circumstance which affords some idea of the enormous passenger traffic over the various railways yesterday. London is famed for the number and excellence of its hotels, but yesterday they were inadequate to accommodate the crowds applying for accommodation. In one Dundas street hotel alone forty cots were brought in to requisition, and placed in the corridors, giving the place the appearance of an emergency hospital; but even with the aid of this expedient, applicants for lodgings were turned away. The experience of every hotel and boarding-house in the city was the same. The crowds which went to Queen's



Park last evening were so great that they were handled only with great difficulty. Through some stupid misunderstanding, the big gates of the exhibition grounds were not opened immediately upon the conclusion of the evening performance, the result being that thousands of people were caught in a dangerous jam at the turnstiles. The turnstiles are an excellent device for handling the crowds entering the grounds, but a very poor means of egress. Last night's crush should convince the directors of the disadvantage and danger of leaving the big gates closed a minute after the grand stand programme is concluded. Today is "Farmers' Day," the banner day of the big fair; the day on which the exhibition is at its best in every

respect. The attendance this morning was unusually great, according to the directors, and if the weather, which has been ideal, continues as at present, there will be a new record to chalk down on the books of the Western Fair board.

THE RING PERFORMANCE

Grand Stand Crowds Were Large and Attendance First Class.

Yesterday's performance, as viewed from the grand stand, was quite as well put on and as well received as that of the day before. The crowds in the stands were very large, and very appreciative. The same programme of attractions was presented and gave general satisfaction. The races were the best yet seen and probably the best that will be seen. Looked at from a grand stand point of view the day was a decided success. In the evening, Prof. Hand's clever and exceedingly well-arranged act is the lightning change done by the four Oliphants, who appeared for the second time last night. The different sketches throughout their act are distinct oddities. Although "horse-play" mainly constitutes the act, it is put on in such mirth-provoking style that even the most stolid are provoked to laughter. While in itself alone the act is a capable one, it is the more appreciated because of the scarcity of humorous acts throughout the bill. The four Oliphants' sketch shows hard training, and the utilization of some very good talent. In the evening, Prof. Hand's fireworks fittingly concluded the performance. Many new ideas have been thought out by the expert pyrotechnist since last fair, and this year's fireworks are the best ever viewed from the big grand stands. Prof. Hand tried a new experiment last night, which worked satisfactorily. It was a representation of a Boer war camp by line attacked by an armored train, and was most realistic, and probably the best arranged set-piece ever put on at the Western Fair. Many of the performers who watched the fireworks last night said they were the best they had ever seen.

The Seventh Regiment Band, under Bandmaster Hiscott's direction, furnished excellent music at both performances.

Paddy R. Captain Brino got his mark on an American track last year and won many good races, so that it was expected that he would "clean up" on a bunch of horses, such as were entered in the free-for-all. Paddy R., by Sir John, went into the race, and by dint of good piloting at the hands of his driver, and good work on his own part, won the race in great fashion. The first heat was won by Paddy R. by Prince Vale, a little horse which showed good mettle and proved anything but a "quitter." The succeeding heats were decidedly interesting, and strange to say, were practically repetitions of each other. Captain Brino or Prince Vale would generally get away well in front and would hold their places until the end of the back stretch on the second half was nearly reached. Then Paddy R., a wicked-looking little gelding, would be seen to gradually glide along and steal past the other two. When the three had reached the head of the stretch, the fight began, each driver using his whip freely and shouting frantically. Paddy R. was always too fast for the others, however. He repeated his act three times and won the race.

The mixed race went to Gay Rex, a pretty little horse, who won in straight heats and practically outdistanced the rest of the field. The race was tiresome owing to the large field and the numerous scorings which were necessitated.
