Scenes in Croatia That Resemble the Incidents of the French Revolution.

Buda-Pesth, June 4. - Mail news from Croatia, where the peasants are in a state of revolt, is beginning to read like pages from the history of the French baronial castle of Ogacedo.

On a recent Sunday the baron and his about a thousand peasants was approaching. The castle had no sooner been barricaded when a throng of several hundred excited men surrounded it on all sides and demanded entrance. "We want to get the banus (governor); he is hiding in the palace." The baron went out on the balcony to plead with the mob, offering to allow three of the leaders to enter and search the house, but a hailstorm of bricks and stones drove him away, and at the same time room to room, from cellar to attic,battering down all doors found locked. The peasants for two hours, until every bit of food and drink was disposed of. Finally the mob demanded that the baron deliver up his Hungarian flag, and when he refused all the flags in the house were confiscated and burned.


