M'GUIRE'S DEATH MYSTERY STILL

No One Knows What He Did During Four Hours Previous to Fatality.

Where was the late John Patrick McGuire between the hours of 11 o'clock Friday night and 3:30 o'clock Saturday morning? This was the question which Coroner McLaren's jury, which gathered last evening in the police station, found to be insoluble. Just how McGuire came to his death, other than that he was run over by a Pere Marquette train near the Hamilton road, remains a mystery.

The jury, however, exonerated the railway company from blame, and stated in their verdict that deceased came to his death while walking or lying on the tracks.

There was evidence to show that deceased was not intoxicated, which increased the wonder that he should have wandered around between the hours above named after reaching the vicinity of his home, for he was seen by C. W. Manning on a Hamilton road street car. He got off the car on the east side of the Pere Marquette tracks on the Hamilton road and proceeded to go southwest across the tracks. Although he was not run over until 3:30 a.m., no person could be found who had seen him during the interval of four and a half hours.

The train crew could throw no light upon the manner of the man's death. Brakeman Robert Oliver, who was standing on the last car, told about finding the body in the ditch after the switch, as the freight was backing from Horton street.

Engineer Thomas A. Brown saw nothing on the track ahead of him as he crossed the Hamilton road, before backing, and stated that the light on the engine was burning.

Dr. Mason said McGuire talked confusedly when he was attending to his injuries. He could not detect any one who was with the man, McGuire died before he was put in the ambulance.

Pierman Wayland said he would have seen McGuire ahead had the latter been standing on the track.

Until someone is found who saw McGuire between 11 p.m. and 3:30 a.m. on the night of his fatality, the circumstances surrounding his death will remain a mystery.

Old and New Wheat Flours.
[By Burr.]

There is always a demand for old wheat flour a long time after the new crop comes in. This demand is not only from the city baker, who makes quality and quantity of flour a life study, but it extends even to the rural districts, where the good farmer's wife has learned that she can get best results from old wheat flour.

This distinction between old and new wheat flours has existed only in latter years, since factory-made flour has become the rule. In the old days, the practice of threshing their wheat out of shock directly after cutting. When they made it a rule to put their wheat in stacks, ricks or barns, and allowed it to remain until all the elements that go to make up a perfect berry had passed from the straw into the grain, there was seldom any choice between the two flours. Then the grain was allowed to pass through the sweating period and become perfectly matured. It was not difficult then for the miller to make flour that would produce good bread the same day it was ground.

Now, as conditions have changed so materially, we must look for and practice the next best thing. It is contentment with the grain as it is, and to grind and hold the flour for six months, when it would be suitable for bread-making purposes.

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
