PLANS TO CHECK THE ALIEN FLOOD

Exclude Undesirable Immigrants.

Washington, D. C., May 19.-The regulation of immigration into the United States by means of an international agreement has been recommended to the Government as the most satisfactory way of excluding thousands of undesirable persons who are now allowed admission. The recommendation is made by Marcus Braun, the agent of the immigration bureau, who is involved in trouble with the Austrian authorities as the result of his activity

in Hungary. Ambassador Storer at Vienna cabled to the state department today that he had been notified by the Austrian Minister of Foreign Affairs that the dtparture of Mr. Braun is desired because he is by birth a Hungarian, though an American citizen by virtue of naturalization; because he has been guilty of disorderly behavior, and because generally it isn't considered advisable to the interests of the good re-lations of the two countries that he

It is in this drastic decision of the Austro-Hungarian Government in Mr. Braun's case that has raised the question with the administration, what shall be done in order that the immigration authorities here may obtain the information necessary to an intelligent supervision of immigration? This information will not be supplied by foreign governments. United States consular agents are not sufficiently expert in knowledge to report the details which are required. Mr. Braun himself proposed the solution in an official report to the department of commerce and labor.







