

****** WOODS AND WIFE

Keepers of a Disorderly House Get Their Deserts - Two Frequenters Go Down.

Joseph Woods, who pleaded guifty to charge of keeping a disorderly house, received a lecture from the police magistrate this morning that was probably one of the most deservedly severe that has been handed out in a long time. Woods was first asked to plead to the charge of selling liquor after hours.
