

PREMIER BORDEN SHOWS PETULANCE

Under Sharp Attack by Chief Whip Pardee of the Opposition.

LIVELY SCENE IN HOUSE

Nomination of Nationalist Blonدين for Deputy Speaker, Causes Critics to Question Loyalty.

Ottawa, Nov. 29. — The latest triumph of the Nationalists—the election of Mr. Pierre Edouard Blonدين as deputy speaker—made a sorry spectacle of the Government in the House this afternoon. Under the vigorous and incisive thrusts of Mr. P. F. Pardee, the Premier lost his temper, and gave the crowded gallery an unusual exhibition of petulance. "If this is the sort of warfare you are going to permit in the House," he exclaimed, "you will find me unable to take our fair share in it." He then attacked Sir Richard Cartwright and Hon. Mackenzie King, of whom was present, charging them with disloyalty, and declaring that Mr. Blonدين, in all his anti-British declarations—"I dare say he was fervent in his utterances," was the Premier's words—was as loyal as the Chief Whip of the Liberal party.

Mr. Pardee met Premier Borden's nomination of Mr. Blonدين with the vigorous arraignment, which kept the Liberal benches in a storm of cheering. On the part of Canadian Liberals, and he believed on the part of the Nationalists generally, he objected to the selection of this man as second in command of the country. He charged that the Nationalist nominee of the Government was disloyal to Canada and had sought by speech and action to stir up sentiment for the purpose of destroying the solidarity of the British Empire. He quoted from the Quebec Chronicle, a Conservative paper, which had denounced the character of the Nationalist campaign, and from L'Evenement, a Nationalist organ, which had reported Mr. Blonدين as declaring: "Canada owes nothing to England. England did not conquer her to plant the cross of Christ here, as did France. She did it simply to get trade." Again, reading from the Hansard debate on the Drummond-Arthabaska by-election, Mr. Pardee read the charge made by Hon. Mr. Brodeur and then declared that Mr. Blonدين at Victoriaville had declared that the only liberties which Canadians enjoyed were those which were snatched from England. England had "sown the world with hatred, quarrels and wars." "We have had enough of England and the English."

A Tardy Denial. Mr. Blonدين rose and exclaimed that he had said nothing disloyal. Mr. Pardee retorted, and the Liberal cheering, that the denial was tardy. Mr. Blonدين had told the House in the debate in question that he was "not ashamed of what I said, and will repeat it tomorrow, if called on."

Hon. Dr. Bland was present on the occasion of the debate, and stated that he distinctly heard Mr. Blonدين use the words quoted. Speaker Sprague said that Mr. Blonدين's denial must be accepted under the rules of Parliament. He asked Mr. Pardee to withdraw.

Mr. Pardee thought belated denial at the present epoch was not entitled to acceptance. "Does he deny that he is a member of the Nationalist party?" the West Lambton man persisted.

No, I don't, shouted back Mr. Blonدين, whose speaker Sprague again interrupted that, "in view of the denial of the member, his statement must be accepted."

Mr. Pardee said he found himself bound to howl to the ruling of Mr. Speaker. He did so with regret, for he felt very strongly that the man chosen by the Parliament of Canada to be its second in command should be a true and patriotic Canadian, a man who would fill the responsible position with dignity and credit to Canada.

No such appointment as has been suggested by the Prime Minister will meet the approval of true Canadians," he added, amid renewed Liberal cheering.

Major Beattie interpolated that Mr. McLean, former Liberal member for South Huron, had declared in the House that he had no regard for England. "He was defeated at last election, and I don't think he will ever set foot in this House again."

"We were well pleased with the results of our investigation, especially in the State of Massachusetts," said Mr. James Simpson, of Toronto, one of the members. "Not only have they developed a splendid type of schools for industrial training, but they are laying plans that bear the most complete relation to the industrial training."

"Even in the United States, however, educationists themselves are experimenting with scientific subjects in their schools, and some incline too much towards the commercial spirit, and vice versa. We have to arrive at the happy medium."

"New York alone spends \$50,000 per year in evening lectures on educational subjects in its schools, and it is estimated that upwards of a million have attended these lectures during the year."

"We also waited on the government officials at Washington to ascertain what they are doing from a federal standpoint in connection with education. There is a bill now before Congress which asks for \$12,500,000 for the promotion of industrial education, and the bill is expected to pass."

"The preparation of our report will take some time, but it is a task to be completed. The type of schools available for adoption here, and to report on the whole question as to the advisability of industrial training."

SENT FOR TRIAL ON FRAUD CHARGE

Nathan R. Brigg Alleged to Have Sold People's Railway Stock.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ower Sound, Nov. 29.—On a charge of having obtained money under false pretences, Nathan R. Brigg, who was arrested at Berlin recently, was committed for trial today before Magistrate Cresswell. He will come up for a hearing at the county court sessions on Dec. 12.

The charges against Brigg were preferred by Mr. Joseph Clivine, of Fergusham, a member of the Township. The evidence of Mr. Clivine, taken at the hearing, was briefly that last February Brigg, representing at the time as a director of the Peoples' Railway Company, had induced him to subscribe \$210 for stock of the road. He said that Brigg had assured him that the company had secured a Provincial charter to run the road through Osprey from Hudson Bay to the coast, and that with a number of his neighbors, had been induced to subscribe stock, particularly as Brigg had assured them that the road was to be built.

Part of the subscription had been in the form of notes, which, by the terms of the agreement, were to have been placed in a Collingwood bank for the use of the railway. This had not been done, as the notes had been placed in the hands of a Berlin bank. This had caused investigations to be made, and it was found that there was no charter for the road.

Mr. Clivine's story was corroborated by Mr. E. Robinson, a merchant of Fergusham.
