Regiment Made a Fine Showing at the Hamilton Celebration.

The weather was unusually warm, and the men, dressed in tunics and busbies, suffered considerably from the heat.

HUERTA IS UNWILLING TO DISCUSS ELECTIONS

Will Not Make Any Statement for About Two Weeks.

[Canadian Press.] Mexico City, Aug. 15.—President Huerta is unwilling either to deny or confirm that he will be a candidate for the presidency of the republic. The Mexican newspapermen, in a written communication, requested Gen. Huerta to make a statement on this point, calling his attention to the declaration made by Minister of War Blanquet, Wednesday, that Huerta was his choice for the presidency. President Huerta instructed Minister of the Interior Urrutia to reply for him that the present time was too early, and that he would make no statement regarding his possible candidacy within ten to fifteen days.

Much interest has been aroused in political and social circles by the announcement that President Huerta expected to reopen the Chapultepec castle on Saturday, inaugurating his residence there with a farewell dinner to Francis William Stronge, the British minister, who shortly will be succeeded by Sir Lionel Edmond Grey-Carter, former British minister in Central America, who twice has been connected with the legation in Mexico City. The castle has not been open since President Madero was overthrown. It recently has been undergoing repairs. The dinner to Mr. Stronge, it is said, will be the first of a series of brilliant functions planned by President Huerta.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Shetland, Aug. 14.—Yesterday was the greatest day of the year for Shetland, the occasion being the annual picnic. The weather was ideal and everyone had a most enjoyable outing. The crowd arrived early and gathered from all parts of the district.

John Farrell, of Forest, presided, and the program included addresses by R. J. McCormick, Dr. Fairbank, Messrs. Porter, Latimore and Stritett. Violin numbers and solos by Mr. Minn, of Wardsville, were rendered most acceptably.

[Canadian Press.] London, Aug. 15.—Surprise was caused in England by the news from the United States that Ambassador Page had been instructed to apologize to the British Government for the comments made on British-Mexican policy by Henry Lane Wilson, American ambassador to Mexico. The affair had not excited the slightest attention, and the incident has aroused no ill-feeling. The British newspaper had hitherto ignored Ambassador Wilson's statement, but they print it today as an explanation of the grounds for the apology.

JUST 300 YEARS AGO TODAY

THE PILGRIM FATHERS SAILED

Beautiful Memorial Unveiled at Southampton by Ambassador

Page—Erected on Site of Historic Pier From Which the Pilgrims Sailed.

[Canadian Press.] Southampton, Aug. 15.—A memorial in celebration of the tercentenary of the departure of the Pilgrims from Southampton for America, was unveiled here today by Walter Hines Page, the United States ambassador.

It is in the form of a column erected on the site of the pier from which they embarked.

The ceremonies opened with a luncheon in the pier pavilion presided over by the mayor of Southampton. Speeches were made by Sir William W. Portal, Dr. Alexander Hill, president of Hartley University, Southampton; John Morgan Richards and Percy Alden, M. P., who is well known in the United States as a lecturer.

Members of the Alden, Wylow and Brewster families also spoke briefly.

A Big Procession.

After the luncheon a procession, accompanied by bands and the banners of various societies interested in the monument, formed and proceeded to the memorial by way of the West Gate, through which the ship's company passed to the Mayflower on Aug. 15, 1620.

A brief religious service opened the unveiling ceremony, and as an indication of the undenominational character of the occasion it was conducted by the Bishop of Winchester, and Rev. G. S. Saunders, minister of the Above Bar Congregational Chapel, Southampton. The singing was led by the Free Church Choral Union.

The monument, designed by R. M. Lucas, is a column of stone, with bronze panels representing heroic scenes in connection with the Pilgrims. The cost of the monument was defrayed from public subscriptions taken in the United States and in England while the bronze panels were donated by various Pilgrim societies and the descendants of Pilgrim families.

It is located on the pier beyond the West Gate, through which the Pilgrims passed on their way to the Mayflower. This spot was famous long before the time of the Pilgrim Fathers, for tradition asserts that King Canute sat there when he ordered the sea to retreat, and from this pier Shakespeare, who knew Southampton well through his visits to the Earl of Southampton, made the armies of Henry V. embark for their triumphant invasion of France.

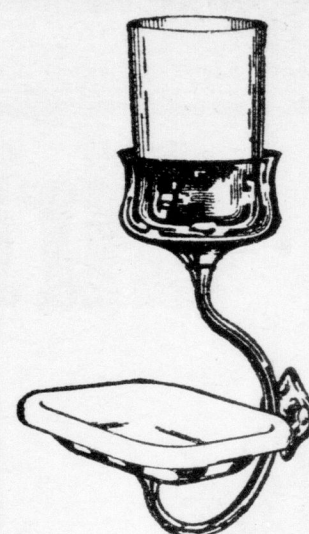
