

Conference Between Union Officials and Premier Ends Without Any Progress Towards an Adjustment of Dispute Being Reached—J. H. Thomas States He Sees No Hope of Avoiding Strike.

1,500,000 MORE PROMISE SUPPORT. London, April 14.—The Federation of General Workers, representing 1,500,000 persons in more than 100 industries outside the triple alliance, decided today to support the triple alliance in its strike in the interest of the striking miners.

London, April 14.-A conference held this morning between Mr. Lloyd George, the premier, and a delegation of officials of the triple alliance, which has called a strike for Friday night in support of the striking miners, was concluded within two hours without any progress apparently having been made toward an adjustment of the grave labor situation. It was reported from the conference that the premier made a long statement, appealing strongly to the railwaymen and transport workers, who, with the miners, made up the "triple alliance," asking them to exercise restraint and not precipitate a crisis.

The situation early this afternoon appeared unchanged, and he outlook gloomy.

THOMAS SAYS PROSPECTS GLOOMY.

London, April 14.—Officials of the triple alliance of labor visted Prime Minister Lloyd George at his residence in Downing street this morning and began a conference which may have a vital bearing on the industrial crisis.

Journalists were told by J. H. Thomas, general secretary of Operations Being Conducted the National Union of Railwaymen, that the call of labormen was at the invitation of Mr. Lloyd George, but the public was left to speculate whether this might indicate a new move toward a settlement of the labor controversy or whether the triple alliance was merely delivering its answer to the prime minister's letters, asking the grounds on which the labor forces had decided to call a strike on Friday. This letter, which was delivered yesterday, was cousidered as an effort on the part of Mr. Lloyd George to keep the way open for further negotiations.
