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SAVED \$12,000 BY SELLING DEBENTURES TO CITIZENS
CHATHAM, Aug. 10.—From March 1, 1918, to December 31, 1920, the city of Chatham has sold debentures totalling \$423,516 without costing the city a cent. These debentures were sold to the citizens at par, thereby effecting a saving of \$12,000.

During the present year, up to July 31, debentures to the value of \$175,500 have been disposed of, making the grand total \$611,016, the savings to the city on the grand total being approximately twenty thousand dollars.

The recent sale of Essex County debentures will serve to illustrate why Chatham prefers to sell its debentures locally. Essex County sold a block of \$120,000 six per cent ten-year instalment bonds through brokers at the price of 96.31. At this figure the money cost that county 6.86 per cent.

The only Chatham debentures disposed of through brokers in the past three years were those issued for hydro purposes.
