



Montreal, April 2.—The discovery of \$8,000 on the persons of two men arrested last night in connection with the hold-up of the car of the Bank of Hochelaga has led the police to be-lieve that they are on the right track. The men were taken into custody in a boarding house in St. Henry division of the city, and after the police had scoured the underworld here. With them were two women who were also held for interrogation, though it is not thought by the police they had anything to do with the crime, which resulted in the death of a bank messenger and a bandit. The police declined to hand out the names of the sus-pects until their investigations are complete. The money found will be examined to see if it had passed through any of the branches of the Bank of Hochelaga, who were sending surplus earnings to the head office in the car held up.
