## TRUE NATIONAL POLICY OFFERED BY LIBERALS

Hon. Ernest Lapointe Justifies  
Course of King Gov-  
ernment.

**MODERATION NEEDED**  
Would Rather Be Defeated  
Than Win by Sectional  
Appeal.

Parliament Buildings, Ottawa, April  
29.—The true national policy is one  
that will permit all Canadians to live  
and give equal justice to all. That  
equal justice, I am afraid, cannot  
come from those who want every-  
thing their own way without consid-  
ering the interests of others, de-  
clared Hon. Ernest Lapointe, min-  
ister of Justice, in the House this after-  
noon.

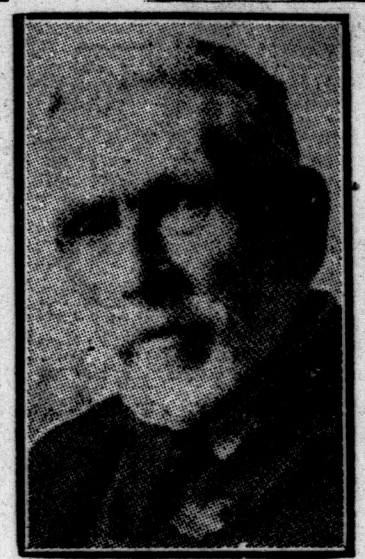
"It cannot come from any party  
which would be eastern or western in  
its character, and whose policy ap-  
peals only to one or the other of our  
great geographical sections. How  
many times did we hear the sugges-  
tion made by different people in  
eastern Canada that Quebec and On-  
tario should unite against the ac-  
tivities of the west? Sir, I would  
rather see the Liberal party and the  
government of which I am a member  
go down to defeat many times than  
attain an ephemeral success, an in-  
glorious victory, by such nefarious  
methods. I believe in Canada, in the  
whole of Canada. Canada for Cana-  
dians has been the policy, but it  
must be Canada for all Canadians,  
not for any privileged section of the  
people."

**Justifies Moderate Policy.**  
This was the intent of the policy  
of the Liberal party and of the  
present government compared with the  
aims and purposes of critical op-  
ponents by Mr. Lapointe. It was the  
conclusion of a speech in which he  
justified the moderate policy of the  
government, its pursuit of the middle  
course which would serve all sections  
of the country to the greatest ad-  
vantage, and its refusal to adopt any  
particular section or sections.

"The party that inscribes modera-  
tion on its banner will stand out  
among the others like the rock of  
Gibraltar," declared the minister.  
While one opposition party was  
advocating one extreme and the other  
opposition party demanding another  
extreme, the government had taken a  
stand on moderation and that had  
secured the interests of the country  
as a whole.

What Canada required, declared  
the minister, was the policy of com-  
promise, the truly British policy by  
which the empire has survived.  
It was such a policy that the gov-  
ernment sought to follow to the end  
of serving the larger interests of the  
dominion. If justification of that  
policy were required, it was to be  
found in the conflicting contentions  
from across the floor. Members had  
announced their intention of going  
against the budget for entirely op-  
posite reasons. They apply illus-  
trated the need for an attempt to  
harmonize their apparently uncon-  
ciling attitudes.

ganda of the official opposition, Mr.  
Lapointe, in his speech, declared the  
admission that the fac-  
tories in Fort William, whose col-  
lapse he had been lamenting, did not  
succumb to tariff reductions on the  
articles they manufactured, because  
there had been none. Dr. Manion's  
complaint was that the government  
had not increased the tariff beyond  
the point where the Conservative  
government left it.

The minister quoted official statis-  
tics to show that not only had the  
number of business failures been de-  
creasing during the last three years,  
but that those occurring were not  
due to causes arising out of the tariff.  
Almost all of them were ascribed  
by Bradstreet's to incompetence, lack  
of capital and similar causes, while  
only 88 out of more than 2,000 are  
due to competition.

He also refuted the assertion that  
this country had the largest per  
capita debt and heaviest taxes in  
the British Empire. Both debt and  
taxes were lowest, the figures on the  
per capita debt being: Canada (fed-  
eral, provincial and municipal) \$44.  
46; Great Britain, \$22.48; Australia,  
\$20.58; New Zealand, \$18.14; South  
Africa, \$14.77. And those on per capita  
taxes: Canada, \$23.51; Great Britain,  
\$39.36; Australia, \$65.22; New Zea-  
land, \$77.12; South Africa, \$75.92.  
Canada's per capita taxes were below  
those of the United States also, her  
debt being higher on account of the  
railways.

**Amendment Weak.**

Describing the Drayton amendment  
to the budget as "emasculated and  
political instrument deprived of all  
vitality," Mr. Lapointe appealed to  
the Progressives to give the tariff  
modification introduced by the gov-  
ernment a chance to vindicate them-  
selves, and to show that the policy  
of the high protectionist was wrong.  
To criticize and to demand prefer-  
ence, which had even been the policy  
of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, he replied that  
last year Canada had imported from  
Great Britain \$150,000,000 worth of  
goods and had sold her \$361,000,000  
worth, and also that the Mother  
Country had paid Canada on the  
goods sent her \$28,000,000 in duties,  
whereas on Canada's exports no duty  
had been paid. The benefit of the  
preference was decidedly to Canada.  
Mr. Lapointe maintained.

The Conservative speaker of the  
day was R. V. Lesueur, West Lamb-  
ton, who could not bring himself to  
agree with the budget, and who de-  
plored the failure of the government  
to attack expenditure. He advised  
it to establish a business adminis-  
tration.

**Leaders To Speak.**

The division is to be reached some  
time tomorrow night or Friday morn-  
ing, unless something intervenes to  
prevent. Before the vote it is the  
intention of Mr. Mackenzie King and  
Mr. Meighen to speak. Others may  
carry the debate into the small hours  
of the morning.

In the red chamber, Senator Cla-  
pierre rose to the defence of the senate.  
Declaring that it was non-partisan,  
democratic and highly essential, he  
pointed out that such major legisla-  
tion which the senate had rejected  
in recent years had been sent to it  
within a few hours of prorogation,  
when no time had been allowed for  
its consideration. The senator saw  
no reason for changing the method  
of selecting the members of the Upper  
House, since a review of those who  
had served in that Chamber showed  
that they were in the front rank in  
experience, capacity and integrity.

**BOARD CUTS \$5,000  
FROM FUEL BILL**

Hawken & Lang Get Con-  
tract For 3,000 Tons  
at \$7.05.

Bituminous and anthracite coal  
tenders let by the executive commit-  
tee of the board of education yester-  
day afternoon will effect a saving of  
approximately \$5,000, as compared  
with last year's coal bill.

The Hawken & Lang Coal Com-  
pany, city, will supply the board with  
3,000 tons of bituminous coal at the  
rate of \$7.05, while William Buchanan  
will supply 200 tons of anthracite  
Scranton egg coal at the rate of  
\$13.50 per ton, and Scranton nut coal  
at the rate of \$14 per ton.

The executive committee decided  
to recommend to the board that the  
public schools be closed on the after-  
noon of May 27, on the occasion of the  
visit to London of Col. Harry Cock-  
shutt, lieutenant-governor of Ontario,  
to inspect the 1,000 cadets in the pub-  
lic school corps.

Captain William H. Robinson,  
superintendent of caretaking and repairs,  
was empowered by the board to pur-  
chase the necessary shrubs for the  
beautification of the London cen-  
tral colliery grounds.

The Hawken & Lang Coal Company  
tender was for Kingston smokeless  
egg coal, with a British thermal unit  
strength of 14,710. The coal is ship-  
ped from Kingston, Fayette county,

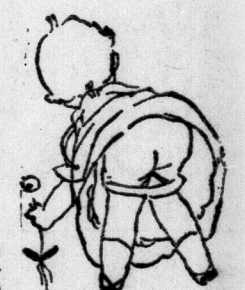

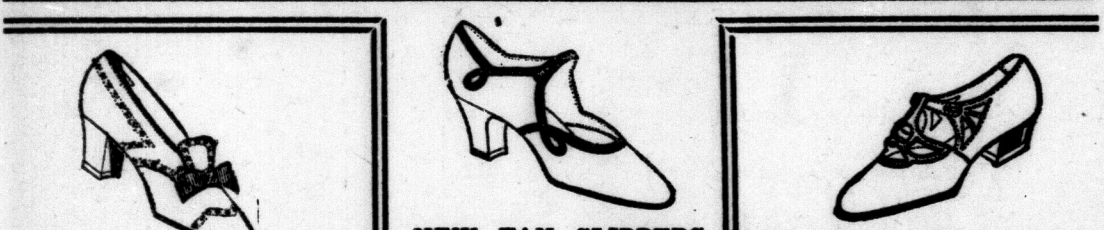
