Describing the Drayton amendment o the budget as an "emasculated political instrument deprived of all virility," Mr. Lapointe appealed to the Progressives to give the tariff modifications inaugurated by the government a chance to vindicate them-selves, and to show that the policy of the high protectionist was wrong. To criticism of the British preference, which had even been the policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, he replied that last year Canada had imported from Great Britain \$150,000,000 worth of goods and had sold her \$361,000,000 worth, and also that the Mother Country had paid Canada on the goods sent here \$28,000,000 in duties, whereas on Canada's exports no duty had been paid.
