Special to The Advertiser. Montreal, July 25 .- R. A. Meagher, liquidator of the Trans-Canada Theatres, Limited, today confirmed a report that the estate of Ambrose Small will take over the Grand Opera House in Toronto in accordance with an agreement made prior

to the failure of the Trans-Canada Under this, the estate exercised the right to claim the theatre upon default in the yearly payments of \$37,000 upon the unpaid balance of \$750,000, When the sale of the theatre was completed the estate had a first lien on the building. The Grand Opera House will be valued, and if the valuation does not reach the amount of the balance outstanding, a claim will be entered with the liqui-

dator for the balance. Mr. Meagher said that liquidation with the Ambrose Small estate is now in progress in connection with finan-cial matters, and it was hoped that amicable agreement will
