Uridiapupdze, Manchurla, July 22.-The Japanese armies at present oc-cupy the position of an immense sickle, with the handle reaching from a few miles south of Liaoyang and circling northward toward Kirin, at the top of the Korean coast, south of Possiet bay. It is estimated that Gen. Nodzu 36, Gen. Kuroki 160, each averaging a thousand men. The numerical strength of the Japanese is 550,000 bayonets, with 2,000 field and mountain guns and about 100 siege guns. The Japanese extreme left is guard-

guns. The Japanese extreme left is guard-ed by Gen. Tamura's cavalry division. The Chinese in the Japanese service are in the centre, screened by cavalry under command of Gen. Ohihara.
