How the Paper Makers Are Destroy

ing the Forests of the United States. The forests of the United States now cover 550,000,000 scres, or about one-fourth of the area of the country. Forests publicly owned contain one-fitth of all timber standing. The timber privately owned is not only four times that publicly owned but it is generally more valuable.

Forestry is not practised on 70 per cent. of the forests publicly owned but on the forests publicly owned ind on less than 1 per cent. of the forests privately owned, or on only 18 per cent of the total area of the forests.

The original forests of the United contained timber in quantity variety far beyond that upon an rarea of similar size in the d. They covered \$80,000,000 acre a stand of not less than \$,260,000,000 door feet of morchantables according to present standards.

10,000,000 board feet of merchantable inaber, according to present standards; of use. There were five great forest regions—the northern, the southern, he central, the Rocky Mountain and he Pacific.

The present rate of cutting is three mes the annual growth of the forests of the United States. The great interies of the Lake States are nearner exhaustion and great introds have een made upon the supply of valuble timber throughout all parts of the country.

the throughout all parts of the country. The heavy demands for timber have been rapidly pushing the great centers of lumber industry towards the South and West. In consequence, the State of Washington has led for several years, in lumber production, followed in order by Louisiana, Texas, Mississiphy, Wisconsin and Arkanass, in 1908 the production of yellow pine tumber amounted to eleven and one-cuarter billion feet; the Douglas fir of the Northwest beld second place, with three and two-thirds billion feet, while white pine came third, with three and one-third billion feet. The annual cut from the forests, including waste in logging and in manufacture, is 20,000,000,000 cubic feet of wood.

There is used in a normal year 90.

8 000.300 cords of fire wood, 40,000,000, 50, 60 board feet of lumber, 118,000,000 hown ties, 1,500,000,000 staves, over 132.400,000 bers of heading, nearly 7 500,000,000 barrel hoops, 2,009,000 cords of native pulp wood, 165,000, 60 cubic feet of round mine timbers and 1,250,000 cords of wood for distillation.

Illation.

In 1999 4,092,000 cords of wood were used in the manufacture of paper, of which 794,000 cords were imported from Canada. The demand for pulp wood is making a severe drain of the spruce forests, which furnish the principle supply. The Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture is conducting investigations to determine what other woods, such as scrub pine, white fir, tupelo and the like, can be successfully used. A larger drain upon forest resources is made by the demand for railroad ies, of which 122,764,000, equivalent three and three-quarters billion over feet, were used in 1998. White als, hitherto the chief source of supply, is not plentiful enough to meet his demand indefinitely, and in many arts of the country the supply of heastnut, cedar and cypress is dwinding; however, seasoning and treating sethods are being found, largely hrough the work of the Forest Serice, by which cheaper and more lentiful woods, such as ledgopole pine the South, are made fit for use as illation.
