**Municipality of Watford.
BY-LAW NO. 6.**

A By-Law to Prohibit the Sale by Retail of Spirituous, Fermented or Other Manufactured Liquors in the Municipality of the Village of Watford.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Watford hereby enacts as follows:

1.—That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in any house or place of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof, except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place other than a house of public entertainment in the said municipality.

2.—That the vote of the electors of the said Corporation of the Village of Watford will be taken on this By-law by the deputy-returning officers hereinafter named on Monday the First day of January, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and continuing until five o'clock in the afternoon at the undermentioned places:—Polling Sub-Division No. 1, comprising all the Village of Watford on the West side of Main Street, Alexander Cameron, Polling Sub-Division No. 2, comprising all the Village of Watford on the East side of Main Street at the Fire Hall, Deputy Returning Officer, William J. Howden.

3.—That on the Twenty-eighth day of December, A.D. 1911, at his office in the Village of Watford at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon the Reeve shall appoint in writing, signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, and one person to attend each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of the By-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-law.

4.—That the Clerk of the said Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Watford shall attend at the Fire Hall at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon on the Second day of January, A.D. 1912, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.

5.—This By-law shall come into force and take effect as from the First day of May next after the final passing thereof.

Toronto Markets.

City Cattle Market, Toronto, Dec. 5.—Receipts, 90 head, with 1,650 head of cattle, 995 sheep and lambs, 600 hogs and 192 calves. Market firm and active for anything of good medium quality, with a very lively demand for anything choice. A few Christmas fed cattle are coming; one load of extra choice heavy export cattle bought for local killing at \$6.50, while good medium choice butchers are quoted firm at \$5.90 to \$6.10. But while good cattle are selling well, common rough light stuff was today a little harder to sell than the same class of cattle was a week or two ago. Canners, in fact, were selling at \$1.50 to \$1.75, which a while ago sold freely at \$2 to \$2.25. All of which goes to show that that particular kind is not much in demand at the present time, when butchers are looking for something a little better and are willing to pay for it.

Sheep are steady around \$3.50 to \$3.60. Lambs a little firmer at \$3 to \$3.40.

Hogs—Market has suddenly become very active, the keen competition sending prices higher. The Harris Abattoir today quotes selects at \$6.50, fed and watered, and \$6.10. f.o.b.
