Ouring the past fortnight business has been moderately active in our market, the fise in the pase of wheat being the leading feature to record. Merchanis are not agreed in opinion as to whether the present addited pressent week have been principally to supply local consumption. Wheat is in good demand, but the better grades are not freely offered, except at rates that buyers are loth to pay. Holders are taking advantage of the reported short supplies, to raise prices, and considerable speculation is said to characterize thange.
