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## L．ATE INTELLIGENCE FROM ANEITEUM

Since our last，a long letter has been re－ ecived from the Kev．Mr Geddie，dated 17th Seitember hast，giving un account of the progress of the mission to that date．We publish his communication in full．It will be seen that the Mission has been again tried with sickness，yet the work is making most encouraging progress．The length of time duving which Mr Giedlic received no cemmu－ nic tion from Nova Scotia，is as unaccounta－ ble to the Board of Foreiga Missions，as it is to Mr Geddie．For the information of the Church we may mention that letters have been regularly sent，but their nct reaching him，must be orring in some way，to the ir－ regulerity of the means of conveyance．－ The Board have thougit it necessary to pub－ lish Mr Geddie＇s remarks on Mr Archibald＇s feaving the mission，yet were it not for the enquiry abrond in the Churen，we would have deemed at better that the matter were wrapped in sience．It is to be regretted that no explenations have been received from Mr Archibadd himself．The Buard have written，：ecking such explanations，but it is doubtful whether their letter has been re－ ceived，and as he had left the island，it is doubtful whether an answer will be reveired． sccompanying the letter was a copy of the book to which Mr Geddic alludes．It is a small pamphlet of 28 pages，containing a fer pissagesift seripture translated into the Ancitcum language，and also $a$ few hymns． We wouilitcall attention to Mir Geddie＇s re－ marksin－regard to clothing for the natives．

I recoived a letter from the Rev．James Waddell，under date August 21 st 1800. － It was refreshing io hear from you once more，after a silence of nearly two years． I read with delight the account which that letter gives of the prosperity of our belov－ ed Kion，in Nova Scotia，and of a coniin－ ued interest in the cause of missions．

## SICiNESS IN THE MISSION．

Sines I last wrote to yon，there has been much aftiction in the mission．Alt our native teachers and their wives have， suffered severely from fever and ague．－ ＇Two of their number，a larotongan man， and a Samoan woman，died，－the former in March，and the latter in Jume．I was present with them in their dying moments and they departed this life in the hope of a blessed immortality beyond the grave． I had slight attacks of intermittent fever in the month of April，and also my daughter Lucretia．Mrs Geddie and our youngest chịd escaped．
progress of the work．
The history of this Mission for the last nine months，has becn one of great trials， and I will also add，of great encourage－ ments．The struggle between Heathen－－ ism and Christianity has begun on this is－ land，and must go on unil the latter is： established on the ruins of the former．－ The nat ves who have given up the old： system，have been much persccuted by their heathen countrymen．The plant？－ tions of many have been destroyed，their properiy stolen，and in some instances， life has been endangered．These trials，I rejoice to say，have in most cases bcen en－ dured with a forbearance and meckness， scracely to be expected from a people just emerging from a state of barbazism．

## prospcets．

Our prospocts at the piesent time are more cheering than at any former period since we landed on the island．After a night of toil it seems as if the dawn of a bright and happy day were not far distant． The whole population are in a state of ex－ citement about the respective claims of the， old and ncer systems，in so far as such 3 people are capable of being excited on such！ a subject，and many are coming over to the Lord＇s side．We have lately been joined by many of our encmies，who are
