THE TARGET.

BOWMANVILLE.—Lieut. Russell, 45th Battalion, of the Wimbledon team, will superintend the band of that battalion in London, England, next summer. The players are all members of the Dominion Organ and Piano Company's band. Mr. Russell was the organizer of the band and is a senior partner in the Dominion Organ and Piano Company.

LINDSAY.—Several members of the Victoria Rifle Association, have sent to England for new Sniders. Already there are several excellent shots. There are now four active rifle associations in Victoria county, all formed last year.

TORONTO.—A large number of officers attended the adjourned meeting respecting the garrison common ranges in the Grenadiers' mess rooms on Tuesday last, and were waited upon by the president, manager, and two or three members of the committee of the Industrial Exhibition with reference to turning the present rifle range into a horse ring. They showed their plan and testified that the land to the north of the track was for sale by the Ontario Government, but the Industrial Exhibition Committee thought it apparently easier to drive the volunteers away altogether than to purchase that land, moreover, they expressed themselves clearly that they should study most their own convenience. One of the deputation stated in conversation that they could do with 50 or 100 feet of the line of the butts now, but in two or three years they would require more. After the deputation had retired the discussion was opened by Lieut.-Col. Gray, M.P.P., with a motion to appoint a committee to give them what they wanted. It must be mentioned that Lieut.-Col. Gray is a member of the exhibition committee which accounts for his being so ready to sacrifice the interests of the volunteers. This motion fell through for want of a seconder. Lieut.-Col. F. Denison then proposed, seconded by Capt. Harston, that the scheme be not entertained. Lieut.-Col. Gibson, M.P.P., President of the Ontario Rifle Association opposed this motion as discourteous, and appealed strongly to the officers not to pass it. He claimed the common as the property of the O. R. A. and intimated that the O. R. A. alone had control of it, and did not at all understand this meeting of Toronto volunteers. Major Dawson then proposed an amendment seconded by Lieut.-Col. Gray, that a committee composed of Lieut.-Cols. Otter, Gibson, Grasset, F. Denison, Major Allen and Capt. Macdonald, Secretary of the O. R. A., should be appointed to discuss the whole subject with the exhibition committee and report to an adjourned meeting. This amendment was carried by a large majority and the motion of Lieut.-Col. Denison lost.

WINNIPEG.—The range at the north end of the city is to be put in shape soon, the riflemen being anxious to get to work, and hoping to make a good record. The council and general meetings of the Manitoba Rifle Association take place on the 15th and 16th at the office of Capt. Scoones. Speculation is rife as to who will be the next president.

RANDOM NOTES FROM VICTORIA AND DURHAM COUNTIES.

Major Hunter, of the 47th Batt., temporarily resident in Victoria County, is one of the best checker players in the county. His brother, Capt. Hunter, now of the 45th, was for many years captain in the 47th under Col. Kirkpatrick.

Lieut. Jordan, No. 2 (Fenelon Falls) Co., 45th Battalion, is revising officer's clerk for the North Riding of Victoria. Adam Hudspeth, Esq., of Lindsay, the revising officer for North Victoria, was the first captain of Lindsay Company in 1866.

The following extract from the *Victoria Warrier* refers to that meeting: "In some respect the best two tableaux of the evening were 'Spoons' and 'Britannia.' In 'Spoons' Lieut. Thornton made an excellent spoon, and no wonder, every one envied him—his spoon. In 'Britannia,' before the curtain rose the old song of the same name was sung, and then the tableau. In the centre on a dais stood Mrs. Calder, representing Liberty, with the British ensign; in line, in infantry, artillery and cavalry uniform, stood the stalwart Capt. Evans, Lieut. Thornton, Sergt. English, Sergt. Hanna, W. Cottingham and J. Calder; representing the Indian army, T. Sherwood, R. Adams, J. English, K. Johnson, S. Sandy, J. Cottingham and T. Stephenson. The group was most striking, so much so that 'God save the Queen' burst simultaneously from the audience, followed by three rousing British cheers."

Lieut. Thornton, of Omamee Company, 45th Battalion, is at present in business in Cobourg. He is an accomplished musician.

Col. Deacon of Lindsay was in Ottawa, on a deputation respecting a post office building for that town, on Thursday last.

Owing to the retirement of Major Scott, 45th Battalion, Bt.-Major Hughes will succeed to the junior majority, and will be succeeded in command of No. 3 Co. by Lieut. Brown of Tyrone. It was Major Hughes whom Col. Williams had with him in the assault on Batoche.
