## A. <u>PRIVILEGES</u>

PART I VARIOUS DUTY AND TAX EXEMPTIONS GRANTED BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

- (a) <u>Diplomatic and Consular Representatives</u>
  - 1. Duty-Free Admission of Imported Goods:
  - (i) Articles for personal use

Heads of mission and career officers of diplomatic missions and consular posts (hereafter referred to as "foreign representatives") whose names appear in the "Diplomatic and Consular List"\* are granted at all times the privilege of entry, free of custom duty and excise taxes, in respect of articles for their personal use or that of their families. Representatives who are permanent residents of Canada should read A I (c) on page 7.

## Procedure

Except for the importation of motor vehicles\*\*, applications for free entry under these regulations should be made in writing to the local collector of customs and excise and submitted in duplicate, (a separate application is required for each importation) accompanied by the common carrier's note of advice.

- For heads of diplomatic missions and career consuls general, these applications in duplicate should bear the mission's seal and the signature of the head of mission or the consul general;
- If they are submitted for career officers of diplomatic missions and consular posts who are <u>eligible for inclusion in</u> <u>the Diplomatic and Consular List</u>, applications must be signed by the concerned officer's head of post, or on his behalf by a designated officer.
