

Canada-United States Trade Agreement

Customs tariff—682a; ex 618. Net floats of aluminum, glass, canvas, cork or rubber, for use exclusively in commercial fishing: free.

Item agreed to.

Customs tariff—688. Artificial teeth, not mounted: free.

Mr. HOMUTH: Is this the teeth in the legislation, Mr. Minister?

Item agreed to.

Customs tariff—693. (iii) Antiquities (other than spirits or wines) produced more than 100 years prior to date of importation, under such regulations, including proof of antiquity, as may be prescribed by the minister: free.

Provided that, notwithstanding anything to the contrary in any law or regulation relating to customs, antiquities as described above shall be relieved from the requirements as to origin or content.

Item agreed to.

Customs tariff—711. All goods not enumerated in this schedule as subject to any other rate of duty, and not otherwise declared free of duty, and not being goods the importation whereof is by law prohibited: 20 per cent.

Provided that duty shall not be deemed to be provided for by this item upon dutiable goods mentioned as "n.o.p." in any preceding tariff item.

Provided further that when the component material of chief value in any non-enumerated article consists of dutiable material enumerated in this schedule as bearing a higher rate of duty than is specified in this tariff item, such non-enumerated article shall be subject to the highest duty which would be chargeable thereon

if it were composed wholly of the component material thereof of chief value, such "component material of chief value" being that component material which shall exceed in value any other single component material in its condition as found in the article.

Mr. MacNICOL: Will the minister explain the significance of this item?

Mr. DUNNING: This is a general, all-inclusive basket item for everything which has not otherwise been provided for in any part of the tariff schedule. Last year from the United States we imported under the item \$6,000,000 worth of all sorts of odds and ends. The long list appears on two pages of the information before me.

Mr. HARRIS: What were the importations for the year before?

Mr. DUNNING: I believe there are sixty-two headings. In the year before, from the United States we imported goods under this item to the value of \$5,300,000.

Mr. MacNICOL: Could the information be placed on *Hansard*. I do not wish the minister to read it, but possibly it could be handed to *Hansard*.

Mr. DUNNING: I should be glad to do that. The table has three columns showing importations from the United Kingdom and the United States, and another column showing total importations. They are as follows:
