CANADA LABOUR CODE

MEASURE TO AMEND

Mr. Louis Plamondon (Richelieu) moved for leave to introduce Bill C-282, an Act to amend the Canada Labour Code (scabs and essential services).

Mr. Plamondon: Mr. Speaker, I am pleased to introduce a Private Member's Bill, an Act to amend the Canada Labour Code (scabs and essential services). The purpose of the Bill is to prohibit hiring people to replace Crown corporation striking or locked out employees. The Bill is also aimed at maintaining essential services during a Crown corporation strike or lockout.
