Ulster Merely Given Chance of Exclusion for Six Years.

NOT THE LAST WORD

Marquis of Crewe So Stated in the House of Lords.

LONDON, June 23.—The crisis in connection with the deadlock in regard granting of home rule to Ireland intered another stage today when the Marquis of Crewe, Liberal leader in the ouse of lords, introduced a bill to mend the Irish home rule bill. The terms of the amending bill are dentical with those offered on March by Premier Asquith and contemptuously refused by Sir Edward Carson, the Irish Unionist leader. who de-

eribed the premier's proposal as a "hypocritical sham."

By the new bill the parliamentary electors of each county in Ulster are to be allowed to decide by vote whether the county shall be excluded from the provisions of the home rule bill for a period of six years from the first meetthe new Irish parliament.


HON. S. H. BLAKE IS CALLED BY DEATH

Prominent Churchman and Lawyer Died at Residence After Long Illness.

FUNERAL ON THURSDAY

Was Once Chancellor of Ontario and a Founder of Wycliffe College.

Hon. Samuel Hume Blake, K.C., 79, lawyer, churchman, and brother of the late Hon. Edward Blake, M.P., died at his residence, 46 Maple avenue, after an illness lasting for some time. DEAD IN APARTMENT an illness lasting for some time, early yesterday morning. Mr. Blake was prominent in Anglican Church circles for many years and was a strong sup-porter of Wycliffe College, and a de-fendant of the Evangelical School of Anglican churchmen. He was noted as a controversialist, and was the writer



1835 and educated at Upper Canada College and the University of Toronto, whence he graduated in 1858. He was called to the bar two years later and was made a Q.C. in 1872. He was soon after elevated to the bench and became vice-chancellor of Ontario, which office he held till 1882, when he retired Gamey enquiry he held a brief for the provincial Conservative organization and had as opposing counsel E.
