

AMENDING BILL REPEATS OFFER

Ulster Merely Given Chance
of Exclusion for Six
Years.

NOT THE LAST WORD

Marquis of Crewe So Stated
in the House of
Lords.

LONDON, June 23.—The crisis in connection with the deadlock regarding the granting of home rule to Ireland entered another stage today when the Marquis of Crewe, Liberal leader in the house of lords, introduced a bill to amend the Irish home rule bill.

The terms of the amending bill are identical with those offered on March 3 by Premier Asquith and contemptuously refused by Sir Edward Carson, the Irish Unionist leader, who described the premier's proposal as a "hypocritical sham."

By the new bill the parliamentary electors of each county in Ulster are to be allowed to decide by vote whether the county shall be excluded from the provisions of the home rule bill for a period of six years from the first meeting of the new Irish parliament.

Without a Parallel.
The situation has never been paralleled in parliamentary procedure in the British Isles. Never before has a bill been presented to parliament to amend a measure not yet on the statute book. This was, however, the only means of overcoming the deadlock, as the house of lords refused to consider the main bill until the full proposals of the government were before it.

In introducing the amending bill, the Marquis of Crewe dwelt much on the religious difficulties surrounding the question of Ulster, but while he admitted the necessity for some form of exclusion for those who deemed themselves affected by the home rule bill, he contended that the exclusion of the entire Province of Ulster would involve great injustice. The government consequently, he said, had reiterated in the amending bill Premier Asquith's proposal of exclusion by counties from the operation of the home rule measure.

Not Final Decision.
The Marquis of Crewe made it quite clear, however, that the amending bill

was not necessarily the government's last word. "The bill gives the widest possible latitude for an amendment," he said, and he explained that under it the civil government in the excluded areas would be administered by the lord lieutenant thru officers to be appointed by him.

The Marquis of Lansdowne, Unionist leader, said he was profoundly disappointed at the fact that the bill merely embodied proposals which had already been rejected. He asserted that it was shabby and undignified for the government to present an unacceptable bill with an open invitation to the opposition to give its assistance in converting it into a workable measure that would avoid civil war.

The government, he declared, was perfectly aware that the amending bill was not sufficient for that purpose. Needs Not Met.

The Marquis expressed relief that the government had at last realized the necessity of making some effort to avert an imminent danger. He wished he could add that its contribution today had met the need for fundamental changes in the Irish home rule bill which alone could make it workable.

The bill was then read a first time, but it is understood that extensive changes are to be made by the Unionist majority in the house of lords when it reaches the committee stage, and that afterward there will be an opportunity for compromise and conciliation.

ATTEMPTED BANK ROBBERY.

CHATHAM MAN FOUND DEAD IN APARTMENT

CHATHAM, Ont., June 23.—The body of Wm. Moss, retired farmer, unmarried, was found in his apartment this morning by his brother-in-law, Alex Lucier, who came into town from Dover township to inquire why Moss had not come out to pay a promised visit. Moss was last seen alive Saturday afternoon, when he told a friend he was not feeling well and proposed going home to take some medicine. An inquest is probable.

INDIAN POLICE HEAD RETURNING TO ENGLAND

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—Sir Edward French, accompanied by Lady French, arrived here from the Orient last night en route to England. Sir Edward has just retired as commissioner general of police in the Punjab district of India after 35 years service. He had charge of the Durbar when King George and Queen Mary visited India.

The couple will return to England by way of Canada.

FEARED JAIL GOVERNOR.

"Please, colonel, don't send me back to the jail. I don't want to go back there, because Gov. Chambers tells me he would like to punish me for the evidence I gave here in the case of the assault against the jail matron." This was the plea made by Johanna Sheehan to Magistrate Denison in the women's court where she was charged yesterday with drunkenness. The colonel complied with her request and remanded her for sentence, observing that the next time she appeared she would go to the Mercer.

HON. S. H. BLAKE IS CALLED BY DEATH

Prominent Churchman and
Lawyer Died at Residence
After Long Illness.

FUNERAL ON THURSDAY

Was Once Chancellor of Ontario
and a Founder of Wy-
cliffe College.

Hon. Samuel Hume Blake, K.C., 79, lawyer, churchman, and brother of the late Hon. Edward Blake, M.P., died at his residence, 46 Maple avenue, after an illness lasting for some time, early yesterday morning. Mr. Blake was prominent in Anglican Church circles for many years and was a strong supporter of Wycliffe College, and a defendant of the Evangelical School of Anglican churchmen. He was noted as a controversialist, and was the writer of many manifestoes and letters to the

press. He also distinguished himself at the bar. His strong points as a lawyer were the examination of witnesses and the addressing of judges and juries.

Mr. Blake was born in Toronto in 1825 and educated at Upper Canada College and the University of Toronto, whence he graduated in 1858. He was called to the bar two years later and was made a Q.C. in 1872. He was soon after elevated to the bench and became vice-chancellor of Ontario, which office he held till 1882, when he retired to resume the practice of law. At the Ganey enquiry he held a brief for the provincial Conservative organization and had as opposing counsel E. F. B. Johnson. K.C. People will long remember the "great split" battle.

Mr. Blake was, normally, a Liberal, but a great part of his time was spent in opposition to his party. He fought the Ross government in its last days and strongly supported Sir James Whitney. In 1911 he supported the reciprocity pact.

Altho an adherent of the Anglican faith Mr. Blake had many characteristics of the Puritans. He opposed fully choral services, and he was constantly fighting what he called "Romanizing practices" in the church. He was the chief founder of Wycliffe College and was the heaviest contributor to it. He was a Sunday school teacher all his life, and was president of the International Sunday School Association, the Toronto Y.M.C.A., and the Laymen's Missionary movement.

The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon from the residence to St. Paul's Church at the cemetery. It will be private, and his family requests that no flowers be sent.

SMUGGLER OF CHINESE
WAS HEAVILY FINED
WATERTOWN, N. Y., June 23.—Lee Sam, or Lee Woo of New York, who yesterday pleaded guilty to smuggling Chinese across the border from Prescott and Brockville, Ont., was today fined \$1000 in the United States court here. His accomplices, among them Jud Clark, a U.S. hotel proprietor, who turned states evidence, were given suspended sentences until next term of court.
