SWORD IN BALANCE

Is Perfectly Ready to Support Austria Should Russia Interfere.

PACIFICISTS TALK WAR

Stock Markets Broke on Prospects of General Conflagration.

Canadian Press Despatch.
BERLIN, July 24.—It was pointed out today that should Russia take part against Austria, Germany was fully prepared to draw the sword on behalf of her ally in accordance with the terms of the triple alliance between Germany, Austria and Italy.

Comment in the German press today strongly supports Austria. Radical organs, such as the Tagblatt and the Frankfurter Gazette, which are in close touch with the financial world, and are usually strongly pacific, find the terms of the Austrian note amply justified. Newspapers, such as the Zeitung-Am-Mittag and the Vossische Zeitung, which are usually responsive to the popular sentiment, also are pro-Austrian and evidently still feel the influence of the assassination of the archduke.

Stock Market Breaks.
The stock market broke badly under the fear of a general European complication. Solid bank stocks, those of the Deutsche Bank, broke many points and other leading stocks from three to four points, until the banks intervened to check further demoralization of the market.

Securities in large amounts, however, had been unloaded at the declines and the breaks in Austrian and Russian specialties assumed almost a panic form. The Orient Railway and Turkish tobacco rose stocks fell 10 points, Russian petroleum, 16 points and Russian banks from 7 to 11 points. The weakness in Russian and Austrian Government bonds also indicated the seriousness of the situation.

Gravity Recognized.
The grave possibilities connected with the strong Austrian note to Serbia, which took virtually the form of an ultimatum, demanding the suppression of the Pan-Serbian movement and the punishment of those concerned in the assassination on June 29 in Bosnia, of the late Archduke Francis Ferdinand, are recognized in official circles here, and is realized in these quarters that further serious developments in Austro-Serbian relations are inevitable unless Serbia complies with the Austrian demands.

It is believed in authoritative quarters that the Serbians will yield unless assured support from outside, and for this reason official eyes here are turned today less to Belgrade than to St. Petersburg, where the decision of the council of ministers is expected to settle the question of peace or war.

It was stated today that Germany had not been consulted regarding the Austrian note to Serbia before its delivery, but that she thoroughly approved the step taken and was prepared for all consequences that might ensue from it.
