RUSSIANS OCCUPY FIFTH OF HUNGARY

Muscovites Also Hold Seven-Eighths of Galicia and All of Bukowina.

ROME, Oct. 8 (via London), 1.30 p.m.—In making answer to the statement from Vienna that the Russians have been completely driven out of Hungary, the Russian ambassador to Italy declared today that Russian forces now occupy the entire province of Bukowina, seven-eighths of Galicia and one-fifth of Hungary, all the passes in the Carpathian Mountains, and the Hungarian towns of Ungvar, Munkeos and Sziget.
