

Society of his constant exertions in promoting their pious and benevolent designs, which in some degree have been attended with success; but not to the extent he hoped for. His Congregation encreases. The Church is nearly complete, and the pews, which are 32 in number, will soon be finished. The situation is central, and convenient to the parishioners. The rent of the pews amounts to £35 per annum, Halifax currency, which affords a fund that with judicious management will accelerate the completion of the Edifice. Lieutenant Governor Gore has promised to erect a Pulpit at his own expence, as soon as a proper artist can be found. Since May last, the children have been regularly catechized every Sunday, and he is much gratified by the proficiency they have made. His Notitia, commencing the 1st of January and ending the 1st of July, 1807, is as follows: Baptisms 22; Marriages 10; Burials 7. He has requested a Bible and Prayer Book for the use of the Church, which the Society have granted him.

The Rev. Mr. Pollard, Missionary at Sandwich, Upper Canada, laments the state of the Church Establishment in such a fine extensive country, with a population of 10,000 people; for whose instruction there are only six of the regular Clergy. That in his District on the River Thames are 500 souls without a Minister, Church, or School. On Lake Erie, another
