PROTEST AGAINST GRAIN RATES ON INTERCOLONIAL

Unduly High Between Points Where There is Lack of Competition.

MONTREAL, July 27.—The high grain rates charged by the Intercolonial Railway on grain shipped from Montreal to points east of Quebec, were the subject of much discussion at a meeting this afternoon between a committee of the council of the local board of trade and the government commission which controls the affairs of the Intercolonial. Local shippers were anxious to know why the government-owned railway rates were so much higher than those charged by the Canadian Pacific Railway, Canadian Northern Railway and the Grand Trunk Railway, whose rates are fixed by the railway commission, a government body, quite distinct, however, from the Intercolonial board of directors. The Intercolonial board promised to look into the matter and make a statement within ten days.

The chief point of protest is that whereas, between Montreal and Lévis, where there is competition, the Intercolonial rates do not exceed those of the other roads, the Intercolonial rates show a wide divergence as soon as that road enters territory where there is no competition to be met with.

to the annexation principle; they always have been; we have never been able to get a report from them favoring it.

"The present expenditure of the town on police service is \$2000; I am not prepared to accept the estimate of our officials that it is necessary to jump this to \$25,000. They spend \$1000 on fire protection, a suggestion to make this expenditure \$15,000 doesn't look very reasonable any more than the suggestion that an annual expenditure of \$2000 on the engineer's department must be made \$25,000. Then don't forget that if we make valuable improvements to this territory we are going to make a big difference to the assessment values, they are naturally bound to be increased.

"Ald. Phelan supported the annexation of East Toronto. Talk about distances. In this case, we went five miles from the city hall North Toronto won't take us further than three and a half miles. Then North Toronto is in possession of many miles of good roadways and sidewalks. There is a good sewer system and preparations for a light system. We took in West Toronto at a time when it next door to bankruptcy and we did it because the interests of Toronto city demanded it. I might also point out that when we took in the western suburbs there was a great deal of property there exempt from taxation. We are up against neither of these disadvantages in the case of North Toronto. The town is financially prosperous and knows nothing of exemptions except on church and such like property.

"I cannot understand how any man with adequate vision of Toronto's future can oppose this move for annexation. It cannot be understood that we cannot afford to restrict our boundaries. Increase of territory must go hand in hand with increase in population. Adopt the restriction principle and you create conditions favorable to the creation of slums and the erection of tenement houses. We want plenty of good cheap land where the poor man can go and build his home and enjoy plenty of good, fresh wholesome air. We owe this much to our right to our future citizens and to the immigrants who are coming here from the congested sections of the old world.

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"As a newspaper has remarked, North Toronto is in the hands of real estate butchers," said Ald. May. "We should get hold of this territory to guarantee its proper development."

"Annexation has invariably proved a stimulus to the prosperity of the city," declared Ald. McCarthy. "Annex North Toronto and Toronto city will surely benefit. Toronto is proceeding fast towards slum conditions and the inclusion of this territory will not as a remedy."

Controller Spence also spoke strongly in favor of the project, while the passage of opposition was further presented by Ald. Baird, O'Neil and Hinton.

N. TORONTO RESTRAINED FROM BLOCKING POWER CO.

Justice Teetzel's Injunction Covers One Week Only—Street Railway Waging Battle.

Justice Teetzel yesterday granted an injunction of one week restraining the Town of North Toronto from interfering with the work of the Toronto and Niagara Power Co. in erecting poles on Eglinton-avenue for a transmission line.

George F. Watson, K.C., appearing for the municipality, argued at some length that it was not the power company that sought the injunction, interfering with the Toronto Street Railway, not the Niagara concern, is doing the work.

Lally McCarthy, K.C., the counsel for the power company, did not deny or confirm this allegation, but pressed for a hearing of the case.

"This proceeding is stopping the work and holding to a project involving over \$500,000," he stated.

A remand until Thursday was granted, when the case will be proceeded with. "Neither party should do anything to aggravate the position of the other during the remand," declared the Justice.
