METHODIST WORLD'S CONGRESS BEGINS

The ecumenical conference meets once in every ten years and this meeting is the second one to be held on this side of the Atlantic, the first being the second ever held, was in Washington, D.C., in the Metropolitan Methodist Episcopal Church, from Oct. 7 to 20, 1891.

The first conference ever held was in Wesley's Chapel, City-road, London, Eng., Sept. 4 to 17, 1831, as was also the third Sept. 4 to 17, 1901.

Two Hundred From Overseas. Two hundred of the five hundred delegates present will represent the eastern section, which includes all who cross the ocean, while the other three hundred will represent the western section, comprising the whole of the American continent.

Dr. Chapman, secretary of the eastern section, is confident that fully seven-eighths of the eastern delegates will be present, which is an excellent showing when it is known that they pay their own expenses to make the long trip. Aside from the officials of the conference, there will be many distinguished laymen, who will occupy the gallery of the great church, the floor being reserved for the conference members.

The differences which exist among the various churches will be recognized, and all discussions on points of doctrine, discipline and church government will be excluded by the conference. The western and eastern sections of the executive committee will select a president for each session.

The Men's Business. An hour during each afternoon session will be devoted to devotional exercises, reading of journal and the presentation of resolutions, etc., not on the regular program. To describe business is the slogan of the conference, and no appointed addresses will be permitted to occupy more than ten minutes. In the general assembly, matters before the conference, no member will be allowed more than five minutes and will not be permitted to speak more than once on the same subject.

There is installed for the convenience of the delegates a branch of the post-office in the church, where mail will be delivered and despatched to all parts of the world.

Among the many social events which will take place during the conference, which lasts from Oct. 4 to 11, will be a reception at the city hall on Thursday of this week at 4.30 p.m., and on Saturday afternoon his honor the lieutenant-governor will give a garden party on the grounds of the Government House. Covers will be laid for 800 at a banquet to be given the delegates in Massey Hall by the Methodist Social Union of the city.

Arrived From the West. A party of 35 or 40 English delegates, who have been enjoying the scenery of the mountains, arrived in the United States yesterday in the afternoon, in the charge of Rev. Blackburn Fitzgerald of Leeds, and are enthusiastic in their praise for Canada and her wonderful resources.

At the afternoon service, which was in attendance, representing the African Methodist Episcopal Church, African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, Colored Methodist Episcopal Church, and other churches, many addresses will be made during the conference, covering every feature of religious work and new departures proposed by some of the delegates.

Information will be derived by these in attendance.

"Il Trovatore" at the Royal Alexandra

The Aborn English Grand Opera Company scored another success last night in the presentation of "Il Trovatore." Love, hate, envy, fear, jealousy, pity, despair, and, in fact, all the emotions, were presented, in striking reality, with a flood of harmony. STRIKE MENACES ASYLUMS OF ONTARIO

Continued From Page 1. men unable to obtain any other job, and just as soon as a vacancy elsewhere presents itself, they leave the asylum's employ.

Some of the skilled mechanics employed at the asylum do not appear to have any too well either. Rarely it appears does their remuneration exceed that of the unskilled laborer, and many of these men are married and with families to support.

A committee of the Canadian Union of Ontario is respectfully directed to a letter and forwarded it to the provincial government, a copy of which has been transmitted to The World, and this we repeat in the future.

A Striking Comparison. The attention of the prime minister has been called to the fact that the action of the Toronto police commissioners, which shows that Toronto, along with other great cities, is desirous of giving reasonable remuneration to those who are engaged by them to do work which is not always of an agreeable nature.

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They get \$20 a month and other perquisites, which would make their pay worth \$38 a month or \$40 a year, and this is the case with many of the attendants in the asylums in Ontario.

Notice the Comparison. A city policeman gets \$1000 a year, works eight hours a day and six days a week after a few years' service. An asylum attendant gets \$54 a year, works ten hours a day and seven days a week, after 17 years' service.

Different in the United States. A comparison with the men engaged in the job of janitor in the United States shows that jailers at least get double the remuneration that is paid by a wealthy province to its attendants in the asylums. The attendants start at \$30 a month and run up to \$60 or more a month. They then are eligible for higher positions in asylums, but to no man living in the United States shows that jailers at least get double the remuneration that is paid by a wealthy province to its attendants in the asylums.

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TURKEY'S APPEAL TO POWERS

Continued From Page 1. the Ports offered a basis of settlement along the lines of the Italian demands set forth in the ultimatum.

The Austrian ambassador had a long interview with the grand vizier this afternoon, and it is announced that the Russian ambassador will visit him tomorrow, but it is questionable whether Said Pasha will be able to remain in office another day.

Hall Pasha, the minister of the interior, insists upon the acceptance of his resignation, but the grand vizier wishes him to accept another portfolio. Fresh efforts have been made to prevail upon Hillmi Pasha to take the ministry of the interior.

Turkish Sink-Admiral Boats. Turkish sink-admiral boats, the Red Sea, and pursued the Turkish destroyer "Pelidshovik" in the Aegean. A large number of volunteers, both soldiers and sailors, well officered, left to-day for the Dardanelles, where the larger portion of the fleet is awaiting orders. Two battleships, the Meostedeh and the Assef-L-Tewfik, and the torpedo-cruiser Berk-I-Satvet have sailed from the Golden Horn to join it.

No coal, petroleum or other fuel is allowed to be sold without the government's permission.

Will Preserve Status in Balkans. It is understood that Austria has given a guarantee to Turkey that the status quo in the Balkans will be maintained. Mehmed Pasha, son of Shiekh Aldeker, the last Algerian sultan, has asked Tripoli for the purpose of arousing all the Mussulmans in Africa to repel the Italian invasion.

The grand vizier's inability to form a cabinet is causing the sultan great worry.

Milmi Pasha resolutely refuses to enter the cabinet, as it is lacking a well-defined policy. Since Said Pasha took office the ministry has had three all-night sittings, in addition to prolonged deliberations during the day, and the grand vizier's inability to tell on the aged grand vizier.

Agosta Takes It Seriously. AGOSTA, Sicily, Oct. 3.—The entire population of Agosta, augmented by that of Syracuse and the surrounding villages, gave an enthusiastic reception to the Turkish fleet which landed by the torpedo boat destroyers Lanciere and Garibaldi. Bands played, flags were flown to the breeze and the people cheered the refugees wherever they went.

The ones who were on the war vessels were mostly people of the lower classes. They give vivid descriptions of the long sufferings they went thru at the hands of the Turks. One of them, the proprietress of an hotel, said that for several days Mussulmans organized a strike to kill her and her family and to paint with Italian blood the houses of Tripoli. The refugees are being housed at the old Capuchin monastery, at the expense of the government.

All the capes and islands around Agosta are being provided with batteries with which to defend the port in case of a Turkish attack by sea. The government also has caused to be erected several wireless stations connecting the harbor here with the headquarters of the general staff at the Ministry of San Domino.

The flagship Vittorio Emanuele left to-day for an unknown destination, but it is believed she is carrying a special escort between Italy and Sicily for steamers transporting troops.

A dozen torpedo boats, the mining cruiser Iride and several coal boats are here awaiting orders.

Naval Manoeuvres. AGOSTA, Sicily, Oct. 3.—An officer of the destroyer Garibaldi, one of the blockading fleet, which has arrived here to recon, in an interview to-day said: "The Turkish steamer reached Tripoli because our instructions were to let her pass. Her landing of arms, being a census bill, was expected to result in the opening of hostilities."

Continued From Page 1. trinkets, which he was offering for souvenirs.

Little business was done, as sight-seers were few, their only way of getting in being by motor car or carrying. All that come by train must pass the guard at Keating Summit, ten miles away, and only an official pass thru the line is recognized.

Considerable anxiety is felt to-night by the state officers in charge because of the non-arrival of several cars of supplies that have been reported on the way.

Need Food and Money. "We want food and we want money" was the appeal of Dr. Dixon, state health commissioner, in charge of the work to-day. "The food supply is getting low and we must find a way to feed them."

The regular water supply has been re-established and to-morrow it is to be made available.

The inquiry into the disaster will be opened on Friday.

The almost hourly revision of the list of missing it is impossible to make an accurate statement of the dead. The feeling is expressed that before being discovered, the bodies have been buried in the wreckage, which frightfully tore and mangled the bodies that have been recovered.

Former District Attorney. The body of Arthur Ainsworth, one of those recovered to-day, was found pinned down to what was the sidewalk by a heavy sign that marked his legal office. Ainsworth was a former district attorney of Potter County. The position of the body and conditions surrounding indicate that he had been buried in the avalanche of debris while leaving his office.

The body of Mrs. A. C. Brown, recovered last yesterday, was found by Capt. Scheil and Sergt. Simmons of the State Constabulary, who had gone out to select a site for a tent in which to house some of the laborers. The men stepped on some loose planks, which yielded, and upon lifting them they found the body.
