CALLOUS AND INHUMAN

Severe Censure by Court in Chieftain Collision Case.

MONTREAL Oct 3-A judgment centring the self-styled pilot, one Sime Hamelin, who was in charge of the vessel Chieftain III., at the time of her collision with the steamship in the river above Quebec, on Aug. 20 last, and hold ing Hamelin responsible for the resultant loss of four lives, was rendered this af-

loss of four lives, was rendered this afternoon in the wreck commissioners court by Captain L. A. Demers, Dominion wreck commissioner.

Charles Pheix, captain of the Chieftain III., is condemned for having on board his vessel at the time of the collision seven persons, in addition to the crew of twelve men, whom the law ceuld only regard as passengers, tho the captain's certificate did not entitle him to carry passengers, and his certificate is suspended for a period of two years, from Aug. 30, 1911. It is recommended that he be granted a mate's certificate for tug boats in minor waters during the period of his suspension.

QUEBEC, Oct. 3.—Buried in the debris, the body of Fireman La Barre of No. 4 Station, was taken out by his companions to-night at 10.30 from the ruins of No. 5 Fire Station, which was utterly wrecked by a fire which broke out shortly after 11 o'clock this morning.
