## CALLOUS AND INHUMAN

Severe Censure by Court in Chieftain Collision Case.

MONTREAL, Oct. 3.—A judgment censure, the first of its kind in the history of the courts, was rendered today in the case of the collision between the steamship *Chieftain* and the tugboat *St. Lawrence*. The *Chieftain*, owned by the Canadian Pacific, was found to be at fault in the collision which resulted in the death of the tugboat's captain, John Smith, and the injury to the *Chieftain's* captain, Charles Phillips. The court found that the *Chieftain* was negligent in not stopping in time to avoid the tugboat, and that the tugboat was also negligent in not maintaining a proper lookout. The court imposed a fine of \$10,000 on the *Chieftain* and a fine of \$5,000 on the tugboat. The court also ordered that the *Chieftain* be suspended from service for a period of three months.

JOSEPH SMITH'S SUDDEN DEATH.  
Joseph Smith, passed away suddenly yesterday at his residence, 48 Rowland-avenue, West Toronto. He was 62 years of age.

Deceased was a well-known and respected business man. He was a grain and feed buyer, and was also largely interested in real estate. He was survived by two sons, Dr. Gerald Smith, residing at home, Jesse Smith, ex-mayor of West Toronto, is a brother. The deceased was a widower, his wife having died two years ago. He was a member of the Disciples Church.

## FIREMAN KILLED IN QUEBEC

Fire Station No. 5 Guttered Amid Sensational Scenes.

QUEBEC, Oct. 3.—Buried in the debris, the body of Fireman La Barre of No. 4 Station, was taken out by his comrades tonight at 10.30 from the ruins of No. 5 Fire Station, which was utterly wrecked by a fire which broke out shortly after 11 o'clock this morning.

The blaze was attended with a number of sensational incidents, the fire spreading so rapidly that the whole station was a mass of flames within a few minutes, and the occupants in the upper stories being out by the blaze.

SASKATOON, Sask., Oct. 3.—Sentence of death was meted out by Judge Lamont here to James Alak, the murderer of Vancou. The prisoner, unkempt and unshaven, listened with stolid indifference. Execution will take place at Prince Albert, Nov. 23.

## METHODIST WORLD'S CONGRESS BEGINS

The ecumenical conference meets once in every ten years and this meeting is the second one to be held on this side of the Atlantic, the first, being the second ever held, was in Washington, D.C., in the Metropolitan Methodist Episcopal Church, from Oct. 7 to 20, 1891. The first conference ever held was in Wesley's Chapel, City-road, London, Eng., Sept. 4 to 17, 1831, as was also the third Sept. 4 to 17, 1901.

## Two Hundred From Overseas.

Two hundred of the five hundred delegates present will represent the eastern section, which includes all who cross the ocean, while the other three hundred will represent the western section, comprising the whole of the American continent. Dr. Chapman, secretary of the eastern section, is confident that fully seven-eighths of the eastern delegates will be present, which is an excellent showing when it is known that they pay their own expenses to make the long trip. Aside from the officials of the conference, there will be many visitors in attendance, who will occupy the gallery of the great church, the floor being reserved for the conference members. The differences which exist among the various churches will be recognized, and all discussions on points of doctrine, discipline and church government will be excluded by the conference. The western and eastern sections of the executive committee will select a president for each session.

## An Hour of Devotion.

An hour during each afternoon session will be devoted to devotional exercises, reading of journal and the presentation of resolutions, etc., not on the regular program. To dispel business is the slogan of the conference, and no appointed addresses will be permitted to occupy more than ten minutes. In general, the conference opens at Metropolitan Church, 10 a.m., 2:30 p.m.

## TURKEY'S APPEAL

TO POWERS VAIN

Continued From Page 1.

The Porte offers a basis of settlement along the lines of the Italian demands set forth in the ultimatum.

The Austrian ambassador had a long interview with the grand vizier this afternoon, and it is announced that the Russian ambassador will visit him tomorrow, but it is questionable whether Said Pasha will be able to remain in office another day.

Halli Pasha, the minister of the interior, insists upon the acceptance of his resignation, but the grand vizier wishes him to accept another portfolio. Fresh efforts have been made to prevail upon Halli Pasha to take the ministry of the interior.

Considerable reports that an Italian warship has sunk two motor boats near Haidela, a seaport on the Red Sea, and pursued the Turkish destroyer *Polishkevich*.

A large number of volunteers, both soldiers and sailors, well officered, left today for the Dardanelles, where the larger portion of the fleet is awaiting orders. Two battleships, the *Meudon* and the *Asser-Lewik*, and the torpedo cruiser *Berk-Satvet* have sailed from the Golden Horn to join it. No coal, petroleum or other fuel is allowed to be sold without the government's permission.

Will Preserve Status in Balkans.

It is understood that Austria has given a guarantee to Turkey that the status quo in the Balkans will be maintained. Mehmed Pasha, son of Sheikh Alidekher, the last Algerian governor, has asked the sultan to allow him to return to Tripoli for the purpose of arousing all the Mussulmans in Africa to repel the Italian invasion.

The grand vizier's inability to form a cabinet is causing the sultan great worry.
