The wheat production in Southern Saskatchewan was good, but there ern Saskatchewan was good, but there is a large amount yet unthreshed, and will remain unthreshed until the spr.ng. In the meantime a good deal of it is stacked and some of it stooped, surrounded by snow, but it will keep in this way in good condition until it is threshed in the spring, with little or no loss or deterioration in quality.
