

WOULD SIMPLIFY GOVERNMENT OF CITY

Controller Foster's Proposal to Abolish Several Committees and Make Each Controller Responsible for a Department Was Sent on to Council.

With a view to simplifying the routine work of the city government and to supervise the expenditures of the appropriations voted by council, the board of control yesterday passed a motion, moved by Controller Foster, to the effect that each member of the board should be vested with additional duties and given a partial supervision over the one branch of the city service. The motion provides that there shall only be three committees, the works, the property, and the parks and exhibition. All the others are to be merged into these. With the exception of the legislation and reception committee, the work of which will be undertaken by the board of control. Home Helps

An easy way to fill preserve jars is to use a gravy boat. The handle makes it easy to dip into the boiling kettle of fruit, and the long neck fits into either quart or pint jars and prevents any spilling of the juice.

When preparing a leg of lamb for roasting, pin on thin slices of bacon with whole cloves, and the flavor of the meat will be fine.

Lemonade, as well as other fruit drinks, will be found much more easily made and "smoother" if a syrup is used instead of sugar for sweetening.

An excellent rule for the lemonade is to allow two tablespoonfuls of syrup and three tablespoonfuls of the lemon juice to a cupful of water.

To remove rust from steel articles rub them with kerosene oil and let them soak 24 hours. Make a paste of emery dust and kerosene and rub on to give a polish.

Diagonal Streets. Kid gloves may be cleaned when slightly soiled with a small piece of oiled cloth and rubbed about the finger and rubbed vigorously over the surface of the glove.

HANDSOME TRAYS. The shops are full of really beautiful and inexpensive trays, but you can, if you wish, improve on them and add a touch of individuality to them that will make them distinctly yours.

Consider first the tray of cretonne, under glass, with a wicker or wooden frame. Don't buy just any tray because it strikes your fancy, but have a piece of the same cretonne or chintz that you use for your summer hangings made into a tray. It will then become an integral part of your scheme of house decoration.

If you do cross-stitch—and who does not nowadays?—you can make the most alluring sort of a tray. Begin by putting your initials in the middle. Add a stiff bouquet of orange tree at each side, and a basket of flowers with a daisy bird above and a cluster of rosebuds beneath. Then measure carefully and work a border of rosebuds or oranges and leaves all around. The work should be done on hand-woven linen, creamy color and you must choose your colors to match the color scheme of the room where it is to be used. Then have this finished piece framed in mahogany or green enamel, molding and add copper or brass handles. It will be something which everyone will admire and which your children and grandchildren will cherish.

A very effective tray may be made by putting the finished Japanese stencil over a piece of golden yellow or deep blue grass cloth and framing the whole thing in a piece of dark oak, rubbed down to a soft wax finish. Japanese stencils may be had at any

NEW YORK STRUCTURES THAT
BEEN TRANSPLANTED.

The discussion aroused over the recent offer made by Henry C. Frick to give the old Lenox Library structure in New York to the city and remove it free of expense to the site of the antiquated Arsenal in Central Park, recalls the case of a famous church, which when torn down in New York nearly seventy years ago, was carefully removed, stone by stone, and set up, stone by stone, in Jersey City. This, explains the New York Times, was a historic Wall-street Presbyterian Church, and was the first church edifice in the city, popularly known in that denomination as the "Old First St. Church." The church was organized in 1715, and the original building was put up in Wall-street, directly opposite New-street, soon after. A part of the old church plot is now covered by the lowering structure of the Bankers' Trust Company.

In 1810 the church was enlarged and rebuilt of brownstone, ornamented in front with a row of pillars in demure of the Corinthian capitals. It was sixty feet wide and possessed a tall and graceful spire. In 1844, owing to the changing conditions in Wall-street, the church was moved to its present site, and the old Fifth-avenue block front was bought for the new home.

About this time, a Presbyterian church of Jersey City was contemplating the erection of a new building and offering to buy the material of the old Wall-street church. It was sold for \$3000.

The stones were marked as they were torn down, and the following year the historic structure that had long been a service under another Presbyterian pastor on the corner of Washington and Sussex-streets, Jersey City, and remained there for many years.

A more recent case was the removal of the white and black Venetian Gothic structure long occupied by the Academy of Design, on the northeast corner of Fourth-avenue and Twenty-third-street. When this building was sold, several years ago, to the Metropolitan Insurance Company, it was carried stone by stone to 142nd-street, west of Convent-avenue, and reconstructed as the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes.
