CAPT. KAIN'S WIFE **HEARD AT INQUEST**

Thought Hospital Not Quiet Enough for a Nervous Patient.

Denial that Captain L. H. Kain's fast alleged utterance was that "Can-ada needs to be ashamed of the way she has treated her soldiers" was made by Captain H. C. Wates, medical officer to sick officers in the base hospital, at the morgue last night during the seventh sitting of the inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death of Cadet F. N. Davidson, who died in that institution from the effects

After being asked just what he insinuated by Crown Attorney R. Greer, Capt. Wales stated that Capt. (Rev.) Kain's last utberances were curses, and not the above statement as it had and not the above statement as it had appeared in the press. He was of the opinion that it threw a slur on the medical officer at the base hospital.

Mrs. L. H. Kain, the widow of Capt. Kain, was the first witness called by the crown. She was of the opinion that the hospital was not quiet enough ceedingly nervous disposition thought this had a great deal to do with her husband's death.

Mr. Greer: "Do you think there was any unwarranted crowding?"

"No," she replied. "Had my hus-rand had his own doctor I am sure he would have got along better." Mrs. Kain stated that her husband was chaplain at Niagara camp for two months previous to his illness, that he contracted a bad cold and came to Toronto, and on the advice of a medical officer went to the base hospital for treatment. She told of her first visit to the hospital, and said she knew as soon as she saw him that he was in a

Mr. Greer: "When did your husband first complain of the hospital condi-tions?"—"The first time I visited him." Mrs. Kain stated that her husband rational up to a few hours before death. That Mrs. Kain's statement that three men died while she was in the room was false was the contention of the medical officer.


