## CAPT. KAIN'S WIFE HEARD AT INQUEST

Thought Hospital Not Quiet  
Enough for a Nervous Patient.

Denial that Captain L. H. Kain's last alleged utterance was that "Canada needs to be ashamed of the way she has treated her soldiers" was made by Captain H. C. Wales, medical officer in charge of the base hospital at the morgue last night during the seventh sitting of the inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death of Capt. L. H. Kain, who died in that institution from the effects of influenza.

After being asked just what he insinuated by Crown Attorney R. Greer, Capt. Wales stated that Capt. Kain's last utterances were curses, and not the above statement as it had appeared in the press. He was of the opinion that it threw a slur on the medical officer at the base hospital.

Mrs. L. H. Kain, the widow of Capt. Kain, was the first witness called by the crown. She was of the opinion that the hospital was not quiet enough for her husband, who was of an exceedingly nervous disposition. She thought this had a great deal to do with her husband's death.

Mr. Greer: "Do you think there was any unwarranted crowding?"  
Mrs. Kain: "Yes, I think my husband had his own doctor I am sure he would have got along better." Mrs. Kain stated that her husband was taken to the hospital on November 2nd, and that she saw him there for two months previous to his illness, that he contracted a bad cold and came to Toronto, and on the advice of a medical officer went to the base hospital for treatment. She told of her first visit to the hospital, and said she knew as soon as she saw him that he was in a serious condition.

Mr. Greer: "When did your husband first complain of the hospital conditions?"  
Mrs. Kain: "The first time I visited him." Mrs. Kain stated that her husband was rational up to a few hours before his death. She was certain that he was rational when he made the above alleged statement. She placed no blame whatever on individuals, but was of the opinion that the hospital as a whole was at fault.

Capt. H. C. Wales, the medical officer attending Capt. Kain, told of the methods used in the treatment of influenza and pneumonia. He stated that Capt. Kain was very nervous in regard to his condition and was constantly calling for him. No other complaints were done had been done for him. He was the only medical officer for 40 to 60 patients.

That Mrs. Kain's statement that three men died while she was in the room was false was the contention of the medical officer.

Mr. Greer: "Then the statement that he was not properly examined is false?"  
Mrs. Kain: "Yes. The newspapers of this city have given us a very raw deal." He was of the opinion that an unwarranted attack had been made on him by the press. Forty to fifty patients could easily be handled by one man he stated. No other complaints were received from other officers under treatment.

Major W. D. Thistle, consulting physician, stated that the patients in the Base were as well treated as other patients in any other hospital.

The inquest was adjourned until to-night.
