Over Holiday Makes Chicago Traders Cautious.

Chicago, Nov. 26.—Evening up of trades so as to avoid open risks on Thanksgiving Day occupied most of the attention of the dealers in corn today, and tended to bring about many changes within narrow limits. The close was firm at ½c to 1½c higher, with December \$1.33% to \$1.34 and May \$1.29½ to \$1.29%. Oats finished ½c off to ½c up, and provisions at an advance of 5c to 50 cents.

Washington, Nov. 26.—Bumper world crops of corn, potatoes, barley, rye, sugar beets and rough rice for this year are shown in estimates compiled by the international institute of agriculture at Rome, made public today by the department of agriculture. The production of wheat, oats and flax seed, however, shows a decrease from the average for the five years ended in 1917.

Wheat production in fourteen countries, excepting the central powers, will reach 2.040.509.000 bushels, 96 per cent of the five-year average. Corn will amount to 3,126.194.000, 14.8 per cent greater than that produced for the last five years.


