FOR MILLION AND HALF

Ottawa, June 9.—The exchequer cou-

ntry is hearing the claim of the At-

lantic and Lake Superior Railway Com-

pany against the crown for a million

and a half dollars.

The company claims that twelve years

ago the Dominion government guaran-

teed an issue of railway bonds, but that

in 1888, when the bonds were offered

to the public, the guarantee was repud-

iated. The crown denies that any guaran-

tee was ever given by the government.

Negotiations have been begun, but no final

contract made.

His New Grain Carrier.

Fort William, June 9.—The Great

Lakes Steamship Company will put

another steamer on the route between

Montreal and Lake Superior, and here

will carry grain and merchandise traffic.

The steamer, which has been named

the "Royal," is under construction at

an English shipyard. She will be 260

feet long, 45 feet beam and 20 feet

deep, and will carry 75,000 bushels of grain

to Montreal.

OF CONTROLLERS' SALARIES

crease was not a point at issue. The

debate waged about the propriety of

with the recollection that when he was

chairman of the legislation committee,

he reported to council all legislation

affecting the city, adopted or rejected

by the controllers' salaries next

January.

fallen in with.

At the sitting of the board, which

followed, the resolution of the legisla-

tion committee was adopted, and with-

out any objection. In fact no comment

of any kind was thought necessary by

the board. Controller Spence was ab-

sent.
