18th Man Wounded Twice, Gassed Three Times.

Pte. Charles Allen, son of Thomas Allen, 320 Richmond street, who enlisted with the 18th Battalion, has been in France for thirty-five months. During this time he has been twice wounded and gassed three times. He is still doing his duty at the front, however. In his letters home he does not give many particulars. He is optimistic, and thinks that the Hun can't hold out much longer. Pte. Allen has been through many of the big

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SAYS NORTH LAND RAISED MORE MEN THAN OLD ONTARIO

Proportion Greater, Declares Ex-Mayor Taylor.

Ex-Mayor George Taylor of London, now of New Liskeard, and who has been visiting in London since his return from Florida, where he spent the winter months, is one of the most enthusiastic of north country boosters. That New Ontario has sent more men to the war, in proportion to its population, than the older and more densely populated sections of Canada, is just one of his declarations.

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
